STATE ENGINEER PERCY CUPPER

There is little incentive under modern political procedure for the best type of men to accept political office under appointment. The place is temporary and when a man is "ditched" at political behest after a few years, he finds his reward in a loss of position in the business world, and probably calumny and abuse from those he has served. All this to preface a few remarks on another rumored change in the official family at Salem. Governor Pierce has apparently followed no fixed policy in the making of his appointments other than a policy of reward to some who had "plugged" for him in the election, but this could cause little complaint, for to make place for his henchmen he has released some office holders who were just that and nothing more.

Rumor now has it that Governor Pierce is about to relieve from duty State Engineer Percy Cupper, one official under the big dome at Salem who has won the confidence of the state through efficient administration of his office, and who was undisturbed through two previous administrations because the best interests of Oregon, particularly of the reclamation projects, dictated that



he be kept on the work. Governor Pierce can not hope to put a man on the job who can do his duty better than has Mr. Cupper.

The Courier would regret exceedingly to see Engineer Cupper removed from office. He has been conservative and careful in administering the office, and Governor Pierce can certainly find no room for complaint upon this score as he and Cupper have had no variant thought in this regard.

Viewed from purely political angles, Governor Pierce will find that a very great number of those who aided in his election would wish to see Mr. Cupper retained, and he will not strengthen his hold upon public sentiment by discarding Mr. Cupper, no matter how competent a man he might put in the place.

BANK OFFICIAL IS ARRESTED

Former Head of Vale Banks Taken at Omaha, Nebraska

Portland, Ore., July 14.—(A. P.)—Gus F. Wildhaber, former president of the United States National bank of Vale and stockholder of the First National Bank of Vale, both of which collapsed in 1921, causing losses in Malheur county, is under arrest at Omaha, Nebraska, according to word received today by Federal District Attorney Coke. The arrest was made on two secret indictments returned by the federal grand jury in Portland recently, charging misappropriation of funds.

London, July 14.—(I. N. S.)—The Prince of Wales may set the styles of London so far as clothes go, but the prime minister is setting the styles for smokers.

Premier Baldwin has long been a devotee of the pipe, and his public espousal of this joy—or vice, as you choose—has given pipe smoking a great boom in London.

The pipe is now the favorite smoke in all of the exclusive clubs, and it is almost a sign that one belongs to the lower middle classes to be seen with a cigarette in the mouth.

Whenever he is coaxed out for dinner the prime minister, once the king is properly toasted, sprays cigarettes and cigars and fills a huge French briar of the bulldog type. His lead is generally followed by most of the elite, and those who haven't a pipe with them feel just as out of place and uncomfortable as though they had worn tan shoes with their evening clothes.

Tobacco shops report that the sale of pipes in the last two months has grown in leaps and bounds and that the business is returning to the pre-war normal.

The prime minister buys his pipes in an exclusive shop in St. James, where they are made especially for him, and where he has his own blend of tobacco mixed.

The Prince of Wales still sticks to huge cigars, no matter what the fashion may be for other smokers.

Horrors! What is England coming to? Two English girls have been discovered—one might almost say apprehended—who prefer to work in a factory instead of being domestic servants in Buckingham Palace.

During a discussion of the lack of domestic servants Robert Cust, a Hempstead magistrate, told in a most pained fashion of two girls whom he had helped to find positions in Buckingham Palace as kitchen maids.

"I was surprised and disgusted a few days later," Cust said, "when we were told that they had given up their jobs. One went back to the factory and the other remained at home unemployed."

Prohibition is a popular topic with most of those who arrive in England from the United States, but Hetty King, actress, is suing a Glasgow paper for \$15,000 on a libel charge, asserting that the paper misquoted her on American prohibition. The Prince of Wales fooled the first drive off the first tee of the first public course in London and ever since every other wealthy golfer has shown a desire to do the same thing. The net result has been that the working men have had great difficulty in getting on the course. Brokers and bankers, doctors and lawyers, nobles and baronets all roll up to the course in their automobiles in such numbers that the poor working men have to stand in long lines waiting their turn to tee off and their only hope of playing seems to be that the wealthy enthusiasts will tire of the novelty of a public course and retire to their own private links once more.
