SIDE STREET PARKING

The parking of automobiles in the
downtown part of Grants Pass is a
question which is bringing out much
discussion and though at the present
time. There is need for a system of
parking such as the one used in
other cities in Oregon, where the
cars are headed in at the curb rather
than backed in. This would al-
low the parking of many more ma-
chines to the block and also make
the parking safer.Grants Pass business houses are
confronted to a few blocks and people
who wish to patronize these places
are forced to go to the side streets
because of the lack of space on
Sixth street. In parking on the
side streets a new problem has arisen.
This is caused by parking on
both sides of a narrow street such
as H street. The pathway in between
is so narrow that there is room for
but one machine to go between. Cars
going in opposite directions at times
have trouble in passing and parked
machines are in danger of being
struck.It has been suggested that the
parking of machines on H street and
other narrow streets be done as it is
on G street. On G street cars are
permitted to park on one side only.
This allows plenty of room for cars
to pass without danger of collisions.
An alternative system of side street
parking would be to allow the cars
to draw up parallel to the curb, thus
allowing them to park on both sides.
It is certain, however, that some
such action is necessary.

Church Seats.

Up until the early part of the four-

Gossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
PopulationLondon, July 17.—(I. N. S.)—
Neither the proponents of the South
nor the proponents of the North will
be enthusiastic over the dramatic
picture of Robert E. Lee, which has
been drawn by John Drinkwater.Drinkwater's "Abraham Lincoln"
was rated as the great play, but the
attempt of this English playwright
to give the Southern side of the pic-
ture in his latest effort "Robert E.
Lee," seems a dismal failure—at
least from an American viewpoint.Lee is pictured by Drinkwater as
a sort of milk-and-water sentiment-
alist. The South will resent this
characterization of this great leader.
The North will resent Drinkwater's
depicting Lee as a poor soldier—
for throughout the play Drinkwater
has Lee consulting with and taking
advice from lowly subordinates.Perhaps the success of the play
is assured by the introduction of the
tune "Dixie." Drinkwater in this
scene has borrowed a leaf from the
book of George M. Cohan. One
scene in Drinkwater's play would be
saved for the Southland, for in it a
Southern soldier dies with the
strains of "Dixie" on his lips, the
chorus being taken up by his com-
rades in grey, who are storming Mal-
vern Hill.Drinkwater seems to have failed
entirely to catch the spirit of the
South and Lee. He has striven to
show Lee as a great man, but has
failed miserably, for he has pic-
tured him merely as a kindly old
gentleman given to sentimental
spoutings.Jefferson Davis is depicted by
Drinkwater as an erratic and emo-
tional character, while Stonewall
Jackson is merely injected into the
play for a few moments to spout
and shout.Americans witnessing the play
get some comedy relief through the
antics of the English actors striv-
ing to depict Southern characters.
The delightful dialect of the South
is entirely lost between the perfect
Oxford accent of Felix Aylmer,
playing Lee, and several gentlemen
with Cockney accents playing the
parts of the private soldiers.Characters throughout the play
continually refer to "the beautiful
PotoMACK," and one character per-
sists in talking of "Waa-shinton."
In producing the play the costum-
ers have elected to dress Lee and
his followers in uniforms modeled
after the Cavalier fashion of cen-
turies ago. The gray uniforms are
true to type in some respects, but
the green trousers worn by Jeb
Stuart's cavalry seem to be out of
place, unless our history books were
all wrong.Drinkwater made a great charac-
ter of Abraham Lincoln. It is too

cot.FEWER TYPHOID DEATHS
RECORD DURING 1922New York, July 17.—(A. P.)—
Control of typhoid fever has made
such progress that in 1922 the death
rate for this disease was the lowest
ever recorded, according to figures
compiled by the Metropolitan Life
Insurance Company.Based on the statistics from one-
seventh of the population of the
United States and Canada, the death
rate in the year mentioned was 5.6
per 100,000 of population. In 1911
the rate was 22.8 per 100,000.These figures are particularly
cheering to the American Child
Health Association, which is engaged
in fighting typhoid as well as other
diseases which affect children and
mothers.

POULTRY

CHICK LOSS IS UNNECESSARY

Timely and Important Points in Poul-
try Raising Given by Missouri
College Expert.Though only half the chicks hatched
in Missouri are raised to maturity,
most of the losses are preventable,
according to M. A. Sexton of the Mis-
souri College of Agriculture.At the present time under ordinary
farm conditions the colony system of
brooding chicks is preferable. The
temperature should be about 100 de-
grees Fahrenheit when the chicks are
placed in the brooder, and then grad-
ually decreased to suit the need of
the chicks. If ample room is supplied
the chicks will regulate their heat by
either crowding closer to the stove or
by moving away.An abundant supply of clean, fresh
water should be kept before the chicks
at all times in some form of suitable
drinking fountain. Do not put the
water in an open vessel, such as a
saucer, or the chicks will get into it
and become chilled.Feeding is a very important factor
in chick raising. Do not feed the
chick until it is fifty hours old or older,
as the yolk is taken into the chick's
body just before it is hatched and so
ample food is present for some time.
The first feed should be composed of
a few grains of clean sand or fine
chick grit, fed in a flat pan or spread
on a cardboard. This should be fol-
lowed with a feed of rolled oats and
bread crumbs, and for the first few
days of the chick's life they should be
given three or four feeds of rolled
oats and one feed of hard-boiled eggs.
The rolled oats should gradually be
replaced with some form of grain mix-
ture, either cornmeal, chick feed or
any form of fine grain mixture. A
dry mash composed of equal weights
of bran, cornmeal and shorts should
be added to the ration at the end of
the first week. This mash should be
fed sparingly at first and then grad-
ually increased. Feed little and often,
and feed all the feed in a dry form.Milk is an excellent feed for chicks
and they should be fed abundant sup-
ply of it at all times. It prevents
many intestinal diseases, supplies vi-
tamins and also is a good source of
protein, which is necessary in chick
rations.

PAYS TO CANDLE EVERY EGG

Testing May Be Done With Much Ac-
curacy by Passing Electric Light
Under Tray.Poultrymen have learned it pays to
candle every egg that goes into the in-
cubator. If only a few eggs are to be
incubated, each one can be candled
separately, but the breeder of many
chicks does not always have time for
this. Instead of candling them in the
rush to get all the incubators going
he often piles in the eggs and takes a
chance on their being fertile. Every
infertile egg takes up space that could
be used in incubating a good egg.
Candling may be done with a fair de-
gree of accuracy by passing an electric
light bulb under the tray after the
eggs have been put in the incubator.
Infertile or stale eggs may be detect-
ed in this way. This is not to be re-
commended if time will permit thorough
candling, but it is better than using
uncandled eggs.Thought for the Day.

CommunityHAWAII SEEKS
RECOGNITION AS
U. S. TERRITORYHonolulu, July 17.—(A. P.)—A
concerted campaign to obtain recog-
nition of Hawaii's status as a terri-
tory and its rights to the benefits
and privileges enjoyed by states, as
set forth in the measure adopted by
the recent legislature, which is
known as "Hawaii's Bill of Rights,"
is being waged by Governor Wallace
R. Farrington and other territorial
officials.The territorial government is
mailing to the governors of all of
the states and to each member of
Congress a copy of the "Bill of
Rights," which was approved April
26. A letter requesting aid in ob-
taining the recognition sought ac-
companies each copy.The bill, containing 16 printed
pages, reviews the history of the
islands from 1853, when annexation
to the United States was considered
for the first time, until the present
day."This declaration and its method
of promulgation are extraordinary,
unique in the history of legislation,"
the document says. "The reason for
this procedure is that an extraordi-
nary and critical situation faces Ha-
waii—one unique in history.""For a quarter of a century Ha-
waii has occupied the legal status of
full and complete political union
with the United States as an in-
tegral part thereof, but a misunder-
standing appears to exist in the con-
gress and in some of the executive
departments of the federal govern-
ment as to the status, which has at
times resulted in the classification
or treatment of Hawaii as if it were
an 'insular possession' in a derogatory
manner to the dignity of this
territory.""The document declares that 'Ha-
waii is in no sense the 'property' of
the United States, inasmuch as Ha-
waii became a part of the union by
voluntary agreement as an inde-
pendent nation, having sovereign
powers co-equal with those of the
United States.' By the manner of
its entrance 'Hawaii acquired cer-
tain inalienable rights, contractual,
equitable and moral, to the main-
tenance of which the good faith of
the United States is pledged,' the

More Students Take to Classics.

An increase in the study of the clas-
sics this year has been announced by
New York university. There were 100
students of Latin a year ago, as com-
pared with 125 this fall. The number
of Greek students increased from 25
to 45. There has been an even more
pronounced increase in the number of
students of the romance languages,
amounting to nearly 75 per cent in
French, or from 434 in 1921 to 757 in
1922.
