Parallel Parking Talked—
At the meeting of the board of
directors of the Chamber of Com-
merce Thursday night, the matter
of parking automobiles on the busi-
ness streets was brought up. One
remedy to the present backing in
method was suggested and brought
some favorable comment. This was
to have a 30-minute parking limit
on Sixth street, with cars parked
parallel to the curb. The business
men felt that this time limit would
make it impossible to use the streets
as a garage and would give custo-
mers and tourists, who desire to pa-
tronize Grants Pass stores a chance
to leave their machines in front
while they enter the places of busi-
ness. As it is, when they find no
place to park, the tourists rush on
through to the next town, the mer-
chants say. No recommendations
were made by the board but the con-
sensus of opinion was for the change
as suggested.

95 PER CENT OF PEOPLE SANE

Only Five in Five Score Show Signs
of Unbalanced Mentality
Syracuse, N. Y., July 27.—(I. N.
S.)—The tradition that "everybody
is a little crazy" is the latest to be
defeated by science, according to Dr.
Thomas E. Bamford, Syracuse au-
thority on psychiatry.
Ninety-five per cent of all human
beings are absolutely sane, Dr. Bam-
ford has declared. The remaining
5 per cent are those who have gen-
erated the popular belief of univer-
sal insanity, he asserted.
"Nearly everybody is sane, not-
withstanding the old saying to the
contrary," Dr. Bamford said. "At
least 95 per cent of the people of
Syracuse are quite normal men-
tally."
"We have to have some sort of a
standard of sanity, and it is a stand-
ard very easily arrived at. There is
the greatest difference in the world
between the brain of the normal man
and the brain of the hydrocephalic
imbecile, for example.
"Any psychiatric expert can de-
tect certain fundamental discrep-
ancies in the brain structure in an
autopsy. For example, the depth of
the brain convolutions, the size of
the cerebrum and cerebellum, would
show incalculable differences be-
tween the brain of an imbecile and
that of a deep thinking individual.
"Therefore," said Dr. Bamford in
conclusion, "I maintain that nearly
everybody is sane. Fortunately,
here the exception proves the rule."
