GETTING SOME RESULTS

The visit of the local delegation to Portland to attend the meeting of the state highway commission appears to be bringing results for it directed the attention of the commissioners to the Redwood highway. The officials did not even know that the commission was on record to appropriate \$50,000 for the Grants Pass-Crescent City project when the money was needed. Probably they would never have known had not the local committee been present. The committee pointed out that Oregon must start work on the 5.4 miles to the state line from the O'Brien school as soon as possible.

There is no reason why Oregon should procrastinate on this project. The money must be spent, for it is pledged and the road is one of real importance. California and the forestry department are spending large

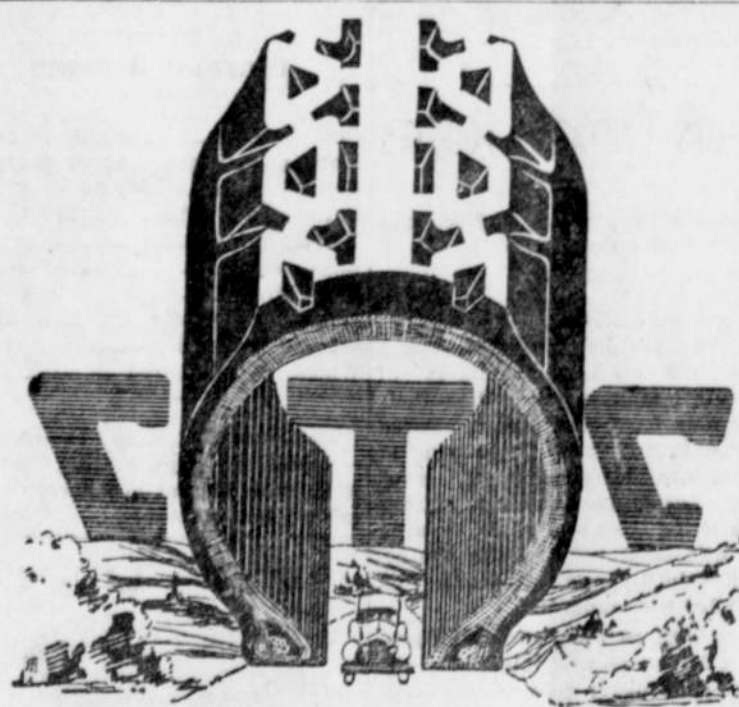

JAPAN DENIES RUSS CLAIMS OF SABOTAGE

Tokio, Aug. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Japan will not agree to the Russian claim that Japanese soldiers in Siberia have in the slightest way damaged Russian property. In this refusal, which seems to be Japan's last word regarding a Russian claim for the (prospective) third Russo-Japanese conference, is contained the key to success or failure for the meeting. The Russian claim that Japanese soldiers have damaged property in Siberia comes as a counter claim to the Japanese demand that Moscow must accept responsibility for the massacre of Japanese soldiers in Nikolaievsk, by Russians, in 1920.

Japan claims a huge indemnity, or at least agreement to an arrangement by Moscow to shoulder consequences of the massacre. Moscow, in answer, indirectly attacks the Japanese army by suggesting that the Japanese soldiers have done things equally bad in Siberia to those done by the Russians who caused the Nikolaievsk massacre.

In addition to the fact that the Russian claim is doubtful as to the justice of it, the claim goes so far as to assail the Japanese army, and Moscow statesmen probably fail to realize that such action is very difficult for old-line Japanese to accept. In this one point there is not alone involved the success of the conference. There is also the possibility that a fall of the Kato ministry, the destruction of the Seiwakai party as a strong factor in Japanese politics, and the complete overturning of Japan's traditional submission to the rights of her army and navy may come about if Japan acceded to this Russian principle.

While there is good reason to believe that Moscow will withdraw

this contention and will accept responsibility with agreement to pay for Nikolaievsk, this one clause of the agenda of A. A. Joffe, the soviet envoy, has caused some consternation among the old-line Japanese. If Joffe does succeed in bringing about such an admission of error by Japan, for Japan's army, to Joffe will go all credit for accomplishing the hitherto impossible. But Tokio is not predicting that such credit will be Joffe's portion.
