PARKING STILL ANNOYS

The parking system used by Grants
Pass is still proving a source of an-
noyance to people of the city as well
as tourists who are finding the sys-
tem a hard one with which to be-
come accustomed. Every day there
are scores of near accidents caused
by cars stopping suddenly in the
middle of the street, preparatory to
backing in, or of cars making a side
swerve into the center of the street.

come. If any action is to be taken,
it should come before the heavy traf-
fic of the summer is over.

Reports Appear Unfounded—

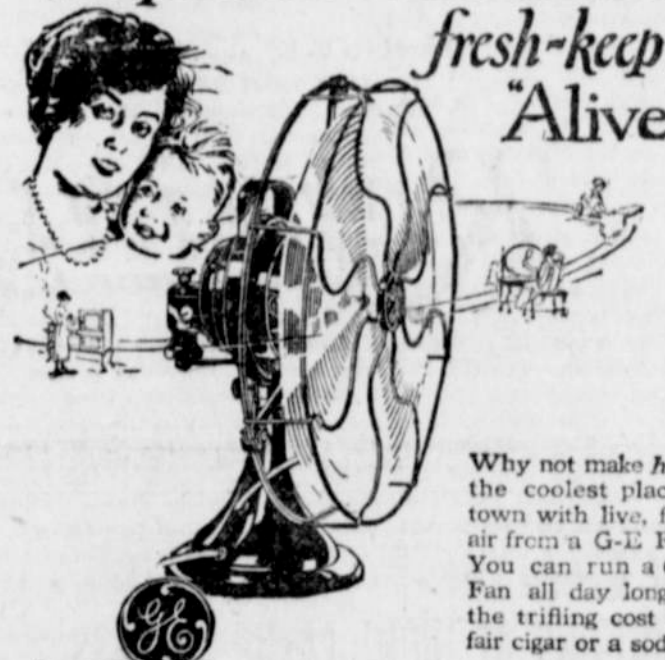
