COMMUNICATED

To the Tax Payers and Electors of
School District No. 7.On Friday afternoon, Aug. 31, at 2
o'clock p. m. at the Washington
school on C street between Third and
Fourth streets there will be submit-
ted to the electors of School District
No. 7 of Josephine County the ques-
tion of whether or not a consolidation
of School Districts No. 7 and 26 of
the said county shall be effected.The Board of Directors of District
seven have investigated the consoli-
dation question very thoroughly and
feel justified in recommending theconsolidation to the electors of the
district.

The assessed valuation of District
No. 26 for 1922 was \$84,692.16.
While figures of this year's valua-
tion are not yet obtainable it is
reasonable to assume that it will not
be less than \$86,000.00. While the
Tax levy for the consolidated dis-
trict in mills is not yet available yet
it can reasonably be assumed that it
will not be less than 21 mills. It can
thus be readily seen that the consoli-
dated district will realize not less
than \$1800.00 from the former dis-
trict No. 26 the first year of the con-
solidation. The only additional ex-
pense the consolidated district will
be under in the education of the
children of District 26 will be the
cost of transportation to the city
schools of Grants Pass. This should
not exceed \$1500.00, leaving a mar-
gin of \$300.00 profit to the consoli-
dated district. District No. 26 will
send to the city schools the first
year of the consolidation not to ex-
ceed thirty-five pupils. This number
of pupils can be segregated among
so large a number of school rooms
that no additional teachers or equip-
ment will be required for their edu-
cation for a number of years to come.
District No. 26 is what is commonly
known as the Gebbers district and ad-
joins District No. 7 on the southwest.
It is composed of the land on both
sides of the Redwood Highway (Cres-
cent City road) for a number of
miles, which said land is in almost
its entirety served with irrigation and
because of its immediate proximity
to Grants Pass due to receive the
greatest increase in value per acre
of any land within the district. As
the years come and go it will bring
a revenue to the consolidated dis-
trict in ever increasing ratio of profit
over cost of education for its school
children. Eventually, and in the
event a consolidation is not effected
District No. 7 will doubtless be forced
to conduct a transportation system
to bring the children of its own dis-
trict living adjacent to the boundar-
ies of the present district No. 26 at its
own expense. It would certainly be
to the interest of the district to con-
solidate and bring the children of
district 26 to the city schools at the
same time and the expense thereof is
not to be figured in comparison with
the increased revenue to be derived
from its assessed valuation. Inci-
dently there is the moral obliga-
tion District No. 7 owes to the child-
ren almost within its gates to extend
to them the privileges of instruction
in the graded schools of a district of
the first class.

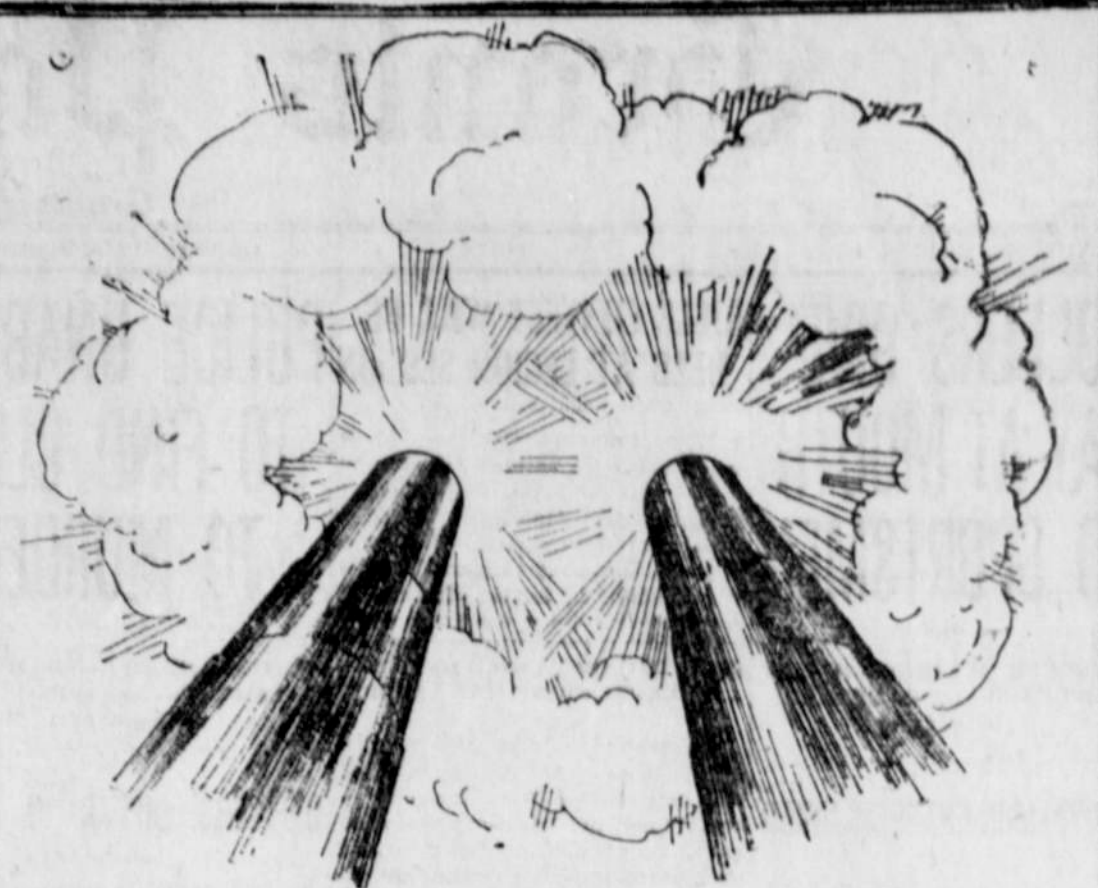

There Is, Also,
