AUTOS AND GAME

The advent of the automobile has brought the passing of the wild life of the nation for regions hitherto inaccessible can now be reached within a few short hours. The trout streams are whipped until even the minnows have disappeared; the prairies have been hunted until the birds have disappeared or are disappearing and the mountains have been invaded until the animals have been decimated. The construction of highways into the wildest parts of the country has resulted in an influx of hunters into those localities. Some species of game, once plentiful, have almost disappeared and the survivors are found only in the zoos and parks where they are the only traces of once innumerable herds.

The western states are faced with the problem of protecting those animals that they now have within their borders. The reserves are rapidly being drained by the large bag limits. Oregon is lucky to have an efficient game commission but even this body is helpless without the whole hearted cooperation of the sportsmen of the state. The killing of deer, which is known to exist in Josephine county, will result more quickly in lessening the wild animal life, than any other agency. Until every man, woman and child makes it a personal matter to see that the laws are not violated, such acts will continue. The fish and game are the property of the whole state and must be regarded as such—not to be ruined by the unlawful actions of a few persons.

AMERICA INTERESTED IN PAYMENT OF DEBTS

Paris, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—America is no longer interested in Europe nor the league of nations. Furthermore, she has no intention of canceling the war debt France owes her.

That was the report Deputy Edouard Herriot, mayor of the city of Lyon, made to his countrymen when he returned from a trip to the United States.

His statements were not at all welcomed by the French, who, like other continental peoples, still look upon Uncle Sam as a Santa Claus who perhaps won't make his rounds this Christmas, but certainly the next if not then at least the one after that, scattering gold dollars wherever he goes. To learn that he is not at all interested in Europe's troubles was a sad blow.

"The Americans like us (the French)," Herriot said in an interview. "In general they have much sympathy for us and our position, but the European question is far from their thoughts. Japan, following the earthquake, absorbed much more of their attention than Europe has received any time since the war."

"What about the French debt?" Herriot was asked.

"It's a grave question," he said. "America is a sympathetic creditor, but she will never abandon the idea of being paid. We must not forget the American war veterans are demanding a bonus and this question and the debt are closely tied up together."

President Coolidge is an amiable person who may be helpful to France, Herriot reported. Americans in turn, hold Premier Poincare in high esteem, he said.

The only ray of hope held out to the French people by Herriot was the promise that American industrialists will continue to buy larger and larger quantities of French products.

Mayor Herriot's trip to America was designed to arouse dollar interest in the famous Lyons International Fair.

SULTAN REGIME MAY BE RE-ESTABLISHED

Sofia, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Bulgarian observers of events in Turkey fail to discern a ray of hope for democracy in the prospect that the Ankara assembly, during its present session will vote for the abolition of the monarchy and the establishment of a republic in the ancient realm of the Sultans. They predict that the scheme for the establishment of a republic will be found to be simply a ruse by which Mustafa Kemal Pasha will transform his present dictatorship into a new sultanate.

It is regarded here as a foregone conclusion that the Ankara Assembly will favor the creation of a Turkish republic. In Turkey today, observers declare, there is but one authority, that of Mustafa Kemal Pasha. He moulds the action of the Assembly at will. The Turks, schooled through generations to submission to a central authority, are still content that the powers of government should be vested in one man.

The supreme object of Mustafa Kemal, Bulgarian politicians point out, is to drive the present Sultan from the throne and seize titular as well as actual supremacy for himself. To accomplish this the plausible pretext of establishing a modern form of government—ostensibly a republic—will be used. When the time seems propitious, however, Bulgarian leaders predict that Mustafa Kemal will cast the republic overboard and proclaim himself the new Sultan of Turkey.

For a time the world may hear of

"President" Mustafa Kemal Pasha and to the unobservant democracy may seem an established reality in Turkey. The consensus of Bulgarian opinion, however, is that Mustafa Kemal will retain his absolute authority even under the republic and will seize the first favorable opportunity to make that authority permanent.

The "one-man" rule of Mustafa Kemal is proving irksome to the Christian element throughout Turkey. Greeks from Asia Minor have been driven away en masse, as have the Armenians. More than 6,000 Greeks, according to reports reaching here, have been driven from Constantinople alone. Confusion among the Christians, including American and Englishmen residing in Turkey, has been increasing. Hundreds of refugees have arrived in Bulgaria. They have managed to bring with them only such possessions as are easily portable and their sufferings are indescribable. Oriental rugs and other possessions are being sold at every street corner in Sofia by these unfortunate.

FILM STARS ARE NOT OVERPAID IS CLAIM

Los Angeles, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Despite the popularity conceived idea that motion picture actresses and actors are the highest paid workers of today, A. M. Brentlinger, auditor of the Norma Talmadge Company, came out with a mass of figures which he claims refutes such an idea and proves that in consideration of their productions film actors and actresses are poorly compensated.

Brentlinger claims that while the late Caruso often received \$3,000 per night and Sarah Bernhardt \$5,000 for many of her circus-ten performances, and that there are but few men and women in the cheapest stock companies who do not receive \$100 weekly for their efforts, film performers get as low as \$5 a performance.

As an illustration, Brentlinger points to the fact that Norma Talmadge productions are shown in approximately 10,000 theatres throughout the world, and that these theatres play a picture on an average of three days. Figuring four performances per day, or 12 performances for the three days, the theatres together give 120,000 performances.

Miss Talmadge is now said to be making three pictures annually at a total cost of \$2,500,000. Computing the cost of each picture with the number of times it is "run", Brentlinger claims the actress pays \$7 to produce each performance.

According to Statistician Brentlinger the actual cost of making a motion picture and the slightly higher "exhibition value" is small and figures at close to \$1 per performance. Of this profit it is claimed that approximately 65 per cent goes back to the producer and the star at the studio.

And out of this profit, Brentlinger claims, must be deducted the expenses

of motion picture production, which he claims are too many to be enumerated.

ENGINE GOES OVER ON SIDE

Open Derailing Switch Puts Freight Off Track—No One Hurt

When the brakeman on the pilot of the engine failed to see an open derailing switch Sunday in the local yards, the engine of an extra west-bound freight went off the track and turned over on its side. The accident occurred early Sunday morning while the fog was so thick that the trainmen were unable to see very far ahead. Another train had pulled out ahead and the brakemen thought the switch had been left closed and that the main line was open, it is said. The engine went off in the soft dirt to the side of the track and did not tip over for some time. As the dirt gave way, the locomotive gradually settled over on its side.

No one was hurt in the accident. The wrecker was brought down from Ashland and worked all day on the derailed engine. It was finally placed back on the track at about 6 o'clock Sunday night. The open switch was located near the planing mill east of the city.

Lesson No. 5

Economical Dishes Easily Prepared

WHERE families are large and incomes not so elastic as might be wished, one of the problems of the homemaker is to serve good, wholesome and tasty dishes that can be prepared at low cost.

Here again, Carnation Milk proves an able ally, for it enables her to have at all times an abundant supply of pure, rich milk at a relatively small expense and by using this in her cooking she can make appetizing and nourishing dishes at much less cost than where expensive cuts of meat and ready-prepared delicatessen goods are used.

For lunch or for the evening meal, a cream soup is a satisfying course. Here is one that is easily made and economical.

Cream of Macaroni Soup



1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup macaroni, broken in 1/4-inch pieces, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour, 3 cups water, 1 cup Carnation Milk. Cook macaroni in boiling salted water about twenty minutes or until soft. Drain. Melt butter; add flour; add salt; then milk and cook five minutes. Combine with macaroni. This recipe serves six people.

Where there is meat left over from a roast or stew the following recipe will suggest an excellent way of making use of it.

Scalloped Meat

2 cups meat, parsley, 1 1/2 cups thin white sauce. Chop meat fine and season with salt and pepper if desired. Mix meat and thin white sauce and put in buttered baking dish, cover the top with buttered bread crumbs and brown in oven 10 or 15 minutes. Cold fish may be shredded and used in the same way. This recipe serves six people.

Corn Bread

Many of our ancestors, particularly those who lived in the "corn" states, practically raised their families on corn bread and milk—a most nourishing and wholesome food. Here's an easy way to make good corn bread: 1/2 cupful flour, 1/2 cupful water, 1 cupful corn meal, 1/2 cupful Carnation Milk, 1 egg, 1/2 tea-

spoonful salt, 2 teaspoonfuls baking powder, 2 tablespoonfuls butter or substitute. Mix flour, corn meal, salt and baking powder. Add unbeaten egg and liquid. Add melted butter and beat vigorously. Pour into shallow pan which has been well oiled and bake in a moderately hot oven. The mixture must be thin.

An inexpensive substitute for cake—one that always pleases the children and many adults is old-fashioned gingerbread. This recipe is one that I have found most satisfactory:

Gingerbread

6 tablespoonfuls water, 2 1/2 cupfuls flour, 1 cup molasses, 2 tablespoonfuls Carnation Milk, 3/4 teaspoonful salt, 8 1/2 teaspoonful soda, 1 1/2 teaspoonfuls ginger, 1/2 cupful butter or lard. Sift dry ingredients together. Add liquid to molasses. Combine mixtures, add shortening and beat well. Pour into oiled shallow pan and bake in moderately hot oven about 25 minutes.
