LETTERGossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
PopulationManila, Nov. 1.—(U. N. S.)—Ninety-
eight per cent of Filipinos harbor
intestinal parasites, and 79 per cent
of the population is infected with
hookworm, according to a circular
just issued by the Director of Health
giving the results of investigations
in various parts of the islands. Car-
bon tetrachloride was found to be
the most effective drug against hook-
worm and tapeworm and to a lesser
degree against ascariis, trichurias and
oxyurias — other dangerous parasites
of the human interior. The high per-
centage of infections was found in
the Province of Cebu, but other por-
tions of the islands showed similar
results. Most of the infections were
of a light nature.The Philippine League of Con-
sumers has filed a protest against
the current agitation among local
chambers of commerce against the
continuance of the C. O. D. parcels
post system from the United
States. They claim that local mer-
chants are charging prices that are
inordinately high.San Fernando, La Union province,
on the west coast of Luzon,
has been designated as a port at
which foreign vessels may load and
unload cargo. Other ports having
similar privileges are: Pulupandan,
Negros; Honagua, Tayabas; Tabaco,
Albay; and Davao, Mindanao. These
ports, however, are not regular ports
of entry.Ponciano C. Caramba, a Manila
resident, has petitioned the local
courts to permit him to change his
surname to Maramba. He claims
much like a favorite Spanish cus-
word that it causes him embarrass-
ment at times.Plans are on foot to bring the 250
healthy children of lepers at the
Culion colony to Manila, where they
may be free from exposure to the
loathsome disease. The ailment has
been found not to be hereditary.A widespread conspiracy to
bring Chinese illegally into the
Philippines through forged certifi-
cates of entry has been unearthed by
the Customs Secret Service. A large
number of Celestials are believed to
have already entered by the illegal
route.The recent differences between
tenant farmers and landlords in
Nait, Cavite province, as a result of
which 1,000 tenants went on strike,
have been ironed out, and an agree-
ment has been entered into between
the conflicting parties.Squatters to the number of 138 on
the United States Military Reserva-
tion in Talarac province are making
a hard fight against being ousted
from Uncle Sam's territory. They re-
cently received an order to clear out,
but have steadfastly refused to do so.Grooming Work Horses
Will Improve ConditionThe old proverb, "Grooming is half
the feeding," as applied to the farm
work horses, still holds true in every
sense of the word. The sweat glands
of the horse eliminate in 24 hours an
amount of waste material nearly
equal to that excreted from the diges-
tive tract. If these glands become
clogged by sweat particles and dirt, a
very important waste channel is closed
and the neglect of thorough grooming
is bound to show up somewhere.LUMBER RATES ARE
TO REMAIN EFFECTIVEMedford, Ore., Nov. 1.—(A. P.)—
A decision which will mean thou-
sands of dollars to the lumber mills
in Medford and vicinity was handed
down Wednesday by the Interstate
Commerce commission according to
the following dispatch received by
A. S. Rosenbaum of this city:Portland, Oct. 31, 1923.
A. S. Rosenbaum, Medford.Advise press and lumber trade In-
terstate Commerce commission have
refused to suspend reduced lumber
rates published in tariff 47-J and
they will become effective Oct. 31st
as published. W. F. M.This decision is final and the rates
are now in effect. This means Med-
ford will be put on an equality with
Klamath Falls and Kirk for the first
time, as far as lumber shipments are
concerned, and that Oregon mills as
a whole will be able to compete suc-
cessfully for business in northern
California.The protest made by California
was as follows:Washington, D. C.—In an unusual
form of complaint directed at Pacific
coast lumber rates, the Los Angeles
Lumber Products corporation, doing
business at the San Pedro harbor,
port of Los Angeles, asked the In-
terstate commerce commission today
to raise rates on lumber from Port-
land, Klamath Falls, Medford, Grants
Pass and other Oregon points, when
shipped to California destinations.The Oregon rates structure, par-
ticularly as it applies on shipments
to Sacramento, Cal., the Los Angeles
corporation declared is a discrimina-
tion against the southern producers.Not only did the Los Angeles com-
plaint make the usual charge in gen-
eral terms of discrimination, but it
also specified the amount of in-
crease which its makers consider the
commission should apply to the Ore-
gon rates.From Portland to Sacramento at
present the lumber rate is 34½ cents
a 100 pounds, the complaint de-
clared, and the commission was
asked to raise it to 36 cents.From Grants Pass, where present
rates are 17 cents, the request was
for an increase to 24 cents. From
Klamath Falls and Medford, which
now have a 15½-cent rate, the Los
Angeles producers would have the
commission raise the charge to 24
cents.After all these increases, the com-
plaint intimated, the San Pedro lum-
ber handlers might be enabled to
compete for the Sacramento busi-
ness.

land Will Be RemovedPortland, Ore., Nov. 1.—(A. P.)—
The "Alder street art gallery," five
has relief figures of nude feminine
forms adorning the facade of a new
building are to disappear because of
public protest. Nicholas M. Ungar,
the building owner, announced today.Portland, Ore., Nov. 1.—(A. P.)—
At noon today a large sign was hung
up over the stone ladies on the facade
of the new Alder street building
bearing these French words: "Honi
soit qui mal y pence" (evil to him
who evil thinks). Mr. Ungar, the
building owner, in a statement said
the figures are to be removed out of
respect to Portland women who ob-
jected to the nude forms.

INCOME TAX IS EXPLAINED

a corporation which makes large
profits but pays little in taxes. Other
examples were mentioned where
high salaried men paid little or no
direct taxes.The income tax is based on fair-
ness and justice. If a man lost
money one year he is allowed to de-
duct the losses from his net income
of the following year. The expenses
of the professional man are deducted
before he is forced to pay any tax.
The banks are exempt because they
are a semi-public institution and
their only excuse for existence is
for the good of the people, but the
dividends paid to stockholders are
taxable.The idea that the income tax will
constitute a double taxation is er-
roneous, Mr. Marsters held, as the
law provides that the amount raised
by the tax shall be deducted from
the state budget. The property tax
will be lessened in proportion to the
amount received. The expenses will
not be increased as the returns can
be made out on the same forms as
those used by the federal govern-
ment and will be handled through
the state tax commission. The speak-
er said that the statement that cap-
ital would be driven from the state
or will shut Oregon is not correct.
The same thing was said of the cor-
poration tax which is now in effect
and which has not discouraged in-
dustry. A corporation, if it oper-
ates at a loss for the first year or
so, is allowed to deduct this loss
from future profits and will not work
a hardship in this respect.After the meeting Mr. Marsters
answered numerous questions in re-
gard to the measure. He speaks to-
night at Williams and will be accom-
panied by a number of local men.

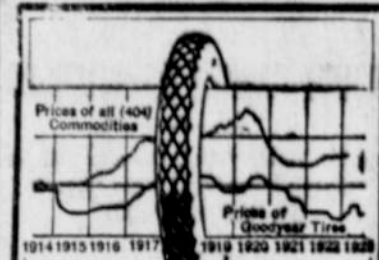
