ADVERTISING PLANS ARE MADE

Secretaries of State Chambers of Commerce Attend Session

The Portland Chamber of Commerce is now formulating plans for the expenditure of the \$300,000 fund raised for advertising and colonizing the state, says A. M. Simons, secretary of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce who has returned from a meeting of the secretaries of the state and the state chamber at Portland. The money is to be used especially to induce settlers to those irrigation districts already in operation, with the purpose that those districts may be kept going. A. S. Dudley, secretary of the state chamber, announced that one of the largest railroads in the northwest will soon give out the details.

The meeting went on record to make a survey of the resources of the various parts of the state so that those in charge of the campaign will know what the state has to sell. This survey will include a listing and appraisal of the farm lands so that some definite data may be presented the prospective settler. O. A. C. is helping by making a complete study of the marketing situation. The college will be ready in January to present all facts possible to accumulate relative to the marketing situation.

It was suggested to the state chamber that next year caravans be organized from various points leading to some other point in the state, and growing in size as they advance. This, it is believed, would sell Oregon to the Oregonians. Other steps were also taken looking to the promotion of the state, 30 secretaries being present at the session as well as men connected with other commercial organizations.

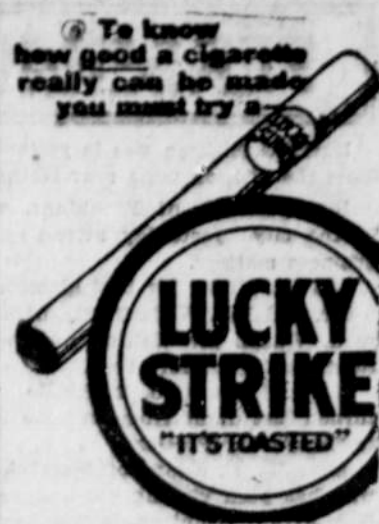

FOOD FOR THE FAMILY

A good dish which is sufficiently nourishing to serve for luncheon is:

Baked Eggs.—To two cups of hot rice add two tablespoons of butter, one-third of a cup of milk and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Beat vigorously three minutes; add one and one-half cups of plums, forced through a sieve, and continue beating until the mixture is thoroughly blended. Pile evenly on a buttered baking dish or platter and make six cavities. Into each cavity drop an uncooked egg and bake until the eggs are set.

A delicious sauce to serve with boiled fish is:

Shrimp Sauce.—Melt three tablespoons of butter and add three tablespoons of flour; mix well, then pour in gradually, while stirring constantly, one and one-half cups of boiling water. Bring to the boiling point and cook five minutes. Add three-quarters of a cup of shrimps, cleaned and cut into small pieces, an egg, slightly beaten, salt and pepper to season. Pour around the well-drained fish. Garnish with lemon quarters.

Drop Cookies.—Cream one-quarter of a cupful each of butter and lard with one cupful of sugar; add one well-beaten egg, five tablespoons of milk, one and three-quarters cups of rolled oats that have been lightly browned in the oven and then put through the meat chopper, one and one-half cups of flour sifted with one-half teaspoonful each of salt and soda, cloves and allspice and three-quarters of a teaspoonful of cinnamon; mix all together and add at the last one-half cupful each of nut meats and raisins. Drop from a teaspoon on a buttered sheet and bake.

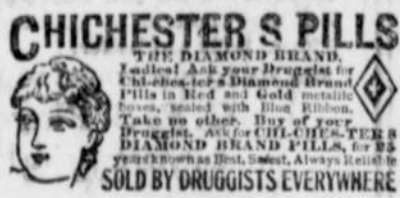

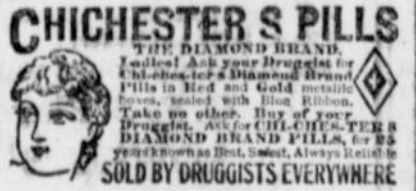
