RIVER BANKS TAKES MANY STOCK AWARDS

The River Banks Farms show herds of Berkshires and Guernseys, Oregon's foremost representatives of these particular breeds of hogs and dairy cattle, returned home today from the Pacific International Livestock Exposition bringing with them 65 award ribbons, trophies of the many hard fought battles of the greatest livestock show in the world. Every River Banks entry was "in the money" when the awards were placed and honors were about equally divided between the River Banks entries, the crack show herd from Washington and the one from California with the \$10,000.00 eastern bull carrying away the grand championship in the Guernsey division. The junior championship was won by the River Banks bull, Summerfield's Victor. River Banks won four top prizes, these being first prize on four-year-old cow; first prize on three-year-old cow; first prize on senior bull calf; and first prize on junior heifer calf, which together with the lesser awards made a total of 26 prizes won by the River Banks entries.

In the Berkshire division River Banks Mastodon again demonstrated his ability to win over all competitors and easily won the senior and then the grand championship of the show, making him the grand champion boar of the Pacific coast this year. His daughter, River Banks Baroness V, won the junior championship. This gilt was the junior and grand champion sow of the Oregon State Fair this year.

The big scoop of the entire swine division, however, was made by the River Banks Farms Berkshire barrows which won first, second, and third prizes as single entries and first and third prizes in the pen entries and then the grand champion pen of three barrows over all breeds and cross-breeds of the whole show. There were 62 entrymen with 147 hogs listed in the barrow contest and the competition was the keenest ever seen at the Pacific International. River Banks Farms won a total of 39 award ribbons or 44 per cent of all the prizes in the Berkshire division.

As an advertising and sales medium the show season has been a very satisfactory one for the River Banks Farms and many sales have been recorded.

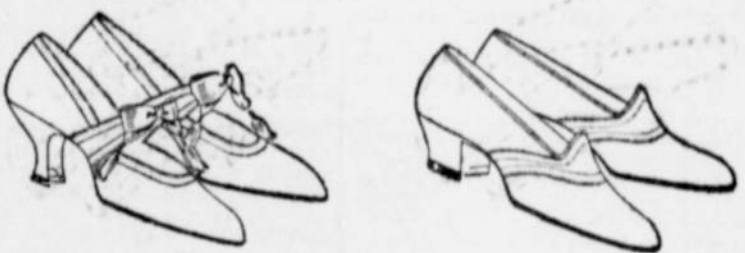
