"APPLIED PSYCHOLOGY"

A former University of Kansas professor has come out with a plan which he believes would help reduce the great number of automobile accidents which occur daily in American cities. This professor, Dr. William A. McKeever, says that by applied psychology it will be easy to eliminate a great number of the accidents.

"There are not more than ten critical points for the driver, for the pedestrian and for the passenger," said Dr. McKeever. "Cover these danger spots with an advance vision in the mind of the individual showing him specifically how to act of what to do, and the safety will take care of itself."

The pledges for the driver are:
I will think ahead; I will drive carefully; I will avoid speeding; I will observe signals; I will manage my auto; I will slacken speed; I will respect pedestrians; I will assist at accidents; I will encourage others; I will assume responsibility.

The pledges for the pedestrian consist of these:

I will be thoughtful; I will follow traffic; I will watch street cars; I will walk deliberately; I will cooperate with drivers; I will stand in safety zone; I will wait for car to stop; I will keep to the right; I will be responsible; I will avoid jay walking.

There is food for thought in the suggestion for with these main thoughts before him, the autoist or the pedestrian will unconsciously be more careful.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
Population

Denver, Dec. 1.—(I. N. S.)—The cleverness and cunning of the wolf was revealed to International News Service by Stanley P. Young, chief of the predatory animal control bureau of the United States Biological Survey, who was moved to reminiscence by the receipt at headquarters here of the skull of the famous Custer wolf, which was trailed for months before being finally captured. Custer wolf was the direct cause of the destruction of livestock to the value of \$25,000, according to government hunters.

The United States government, through the predatory animal control bureau, maintains a corps of trained hunters in the Colorado Rockies to train the outlaws of the range. These men, schooled in wolf lore, constantly combat the killers with rifle, trap and poison bait.

"A bad wolf can come to no good end," declared Young, as he pointed to numerous greasy, yellow-tinted skulls—trophies gathered by government hunters.

"Driven from the plains country when the buffalo herds disappeared," Young continued, "the wolf has taken up his abode in the fastnesses of the Rockies. There he is hunted—hunted because he has made man his enemy."

"Raid upon livestock grazing peacefully in the forest solitudes, and upon deer and elk have turned the forces of the livestock interests, represented by the Colorado Board of Stock Inspection Commissioners against the wolf also."

"Stock losses directly traceable to the wolf amount to thousands of dollars annually."

Young declared that not only does the wolf slay when he is hungry, but he maims—usually fatally—when he is playful.

"In his playful moments," Young said, "which usually come after he has feasted upon the carcass of a fat beef, the wolf will 'harry' a calf, a cow, or a full-grown steer until the animal is exhausted. Then,

with a lust for blood, he springs, sinks his sharp fangs into that portion of the animal where the tail joins the backbone, and another detailed calf, cow or steer appears on the range."

"Where he deserves it or not," Young related, "the wolf is regarded as one of the cleverest predatory animals abroad in the Colorado Rockies. He is a keen observer; his scent is sharper than that of any other animal, and he is wary and cunning."

"It is on this account that government hunters are compelled to match their wits against the wits of the wolf. Frequently the hunters lose, but ultimately the wolf falls a victim to man's well-laid plans."

Young said that hunting wolves was a matter of locating their runs. A wolf-run is a trail through the mountains—an irregular circle marked here and there by scent-posts, over which the wolf travels almost with the exactness of clock-hands circling the face of a clock. To the left and right of this run the wolf hunts, kills and feasts.

On these runs the government hunter lays his traps for the wolf—the trap-setting being a real scientific undertaking and one which demands the greatest care if the "man scent," which warns the wolf, is to be dispelled.

Eventually—on his periodical rounds of his hunting country, which often consumes the better part of a month—the wolf approaches the scent-posts, where heavy steel traps have been placed, steps upon a trap and the steel jaws close over his paw.

Although caught the wolf's battle to escape may be fought for days.

In addition to trapping the government hunters succeed in killing off many wolves by setting poison bait. The same care must be exercised with this method, according to Young, as the intuitive cunning of the animal often upsets the elaborate plans made to catch him with the poison bait.

Portugal's National Epic.
The national epic of Portugal is the "Lusad," written by Luis Vaz de Camoens (1524-1580) and published in 1572, says the Detroit News. The great poem which has been translated into many languages, was begun by Camoens while he was in exile in India and was completed shortly after he was allowed to return to Portugal. Before 1700, 35 editions of the "Lusad" were printed in Lisbon. Although the "Lusad" was, as a piece of literature a tremendous success, it netted its author little financial gain, for, as his epitaph, destroyed in 1775, read, "He lived poor and neglected and so died."

Schell Gets Contract—Bids for the grading and surfacing with gravel of almost ten miles of highway between a point two miles south of Hornbrook and the Oregon line, all in this county, were opened at the office of the state highway commission Tuesday afternoon in Sacramento, says the Klamath News. Two types of bids were called for, one providing for the completion of the work in 180 days, and the other in 200 days. The lowest bid under the 180-day limit totaled \$205,000 and was filed by Dunn & Baker, of Klamath Falls, and S. S. Schell, of Oakland, Oregon, with an offer of \$182,864 is the lowest bidder for the work under the provision of the 200-day limit.

In 1871 and a short time later was appointed Attorney General by President Grant. He was confirmed out of order and in open Senate under the rule of "Senatorial courtesy." He was reappointed as Attorney General by President Grant in 1873 and again similarly confirmed by the Senate. Later he was nominated by President Grant for Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, but there was objection to the confirmation, and the nomination was referred to the Senate Judiciary committee for investigation. Shortly thereafter President Grant withdrew the nomination at the request of Williams.
