***** THE COUNTY POOR FARM *****

The existing conditions in the
county poor farm are regrettable.
The report of the grand jury yester-
day, disclosing the fact that the in-
mates of the home have insufficient
covering and are living under insan-
itary conditions, is such that action
should be taken immediately to rem-
edy the fault. The grand jury is
composed of seven men, all of whom
can be depended upon to tell all
they see and no more. Their state-
ments may be taken at their full
value. Individual members go even
farther than the body in its report,
one member stating that what he
saw was enough to "turn his stom-
ach".

The inmates of the home are pau-
pers. It is true, but they are charges
of the county and are entitled to a
good, decent living. The county is
paying out \$240 a month for the
keep of the eight people now in the
home and the county is entitled to
assurance that this money is going
for the proper care of those whom
circumstances have forced to seek
shelter there. The proper authori-
ties should investigate conditions
and see if the terms of the contract
made with the superintendent are
being carried out. If they are not
being carried out and cannot be
carried out, a new contract should be
made.

The poor farm is surrounded by
a large amount of fertile land which
should be able to produce an income
for the persons who may be operat-
ing the institution. With the money
appropriated for the county charges,
there should be no hardship in pro-
viding the aged men with sufficient
food, clothing and bedding, and to
keep them clean.

The grand jury recommended that
a system be devised whereby a check
can be kept on conditions. The idea
is good and should be adopted. For
after all, these people at the poor
farm look to us for their welfare.
Fate has been unkind enough to
them without making them suffer
more.

M'GRAY TO FACE CHARGES

Indiana Governor Will Stand Trial on
Monday

Indianapolis, Jan. 5.—(I. N. S.)—
When the criminal court of Marion
county opens Monday morning Gov-
ernor Warren T. McCray will be
formally arraigned on charges
brought by the grand jury.

Eight indictments with 192 counts
will be faced by Indiana's chief ex-
ecutive growing out of his personal
financial exploits.

Grand larceny, embezzlement, for-
gery, making false financial state-
ments and giving bad checks are
some of the charges on which the
state's chief executive will be tried.
Developments since the governor
was indicted include the appoint-
ment of a new prosecuting attorney
to fill the place of William P. Evans,
who is the governor's son-in-law.
Evans resigned because he felt that
his connection with the prosecutor's
office might prove embarrassing.

Through the entire proceedings
leading up to the indictments Evans
kept clear of the situation and his
friends claim his course was above
reproach.

Although the governor himself was
vested with the power to name his
son-in-law's successor and used it,
the new prosecutor will not have
charge of the case. Clarence W.
Nichols, special prosecutor, whose
work with the grand jury led to the
indictments, represented the state.

FEWER MEN ARE OUT OF WORK IN EUROPE

London, Jan. 5.—(A. P.)—A
survey of economic conditions and
unemployment figures in the differ-
ent countries of Europe, compiled by
the International Federation of
Trade Unions, shows that in compar-
ison with last year there is in nearly
all countries, excepting Germany, a
notable decline of unemployment.
The industrial situation in some
countries, together with the latest
figures on unemployment, is as fol-
lows:

Belgium—A great revival in in-
dustry; unemployed 12,368.

France—Economic situation high-
ly satisfactory; unemployed 1,363.

Holland—Little change in the la-
bor market; unemployed and par-
tially unemployed 80,222.

Italy—A steady decrease in un-
employment; unemployed 231,590.

Poland—(Exclusive of the former
Prussian territory and Galicia) un-
employed 87,000.

Denmark—Unemployed 20,754.

Norway—Unemployed 12,840.

Sweden—Unemployed 11,009.

Switzerland—Unemployment has
been gradually decreasing for months
past; unemployed 22,840.

Czechoslovakia—Unemployed
(estimated) 200,000.

Austria—Unemployment steadily
declining; unemployed 77,923.

Russia—Unemployment is most
acute among the civil servants, mu-
nicipal employees, clothing workers
and unskilled workers; unemployed
(in 32 towns) 443,000.

Germany—The industrial situa-
tion is changing for the worse in
every branch of industry; unem-
ployed 660,788.

This makes a total of unemployed
for the Continent of 1,961,597. In
Great Britain 1,249,500 persons
were registered as unemployed in
October.

and heat used in his place of busi-
ness, drayage and freight bills, the
cost of repairs and maintenance to
delivery wagons and trucks, and a
reasonable allowance for salaries of
employees. A professional man,
lawyer, doctor, or dentist may de-
duct the cost of supplies used in his
profession, expenses paid in the
operation and repair of an automo-
bile used in making professional
calls, dues to professional societies,
subscriptions to professional journals,
office rent, cost of light, heat, and
water used in his office, and the hire
of office assistants. The farmer may
deduct amounts paid in the produc-
tion and harvesting of his crops, cost
of seed and fertilizer used, cost of
minor repairs to farm buildings
(other than the dwelling), and cost
of small tools used up in the course
of a year or two.

BORAH AGAINST BONUS BILL

Idaho Senator Comes Out for Reduc-
tion of Taxes

New York, Jan. 5.—(A. P.)—De-
claring himself in favor of tax re-
duction and opposed to the soldier
bonus, Senator William E. Borah, of
Idaho, in an address today before
the National Republican club of New
York, said this issue could not be
avoided or sidestepped.

"One is either for tax reduction or
he is against it," he said. "One has
a right to be for the bonus or he has
a right to be for tax reduction. But
he cannot be for both.

"You cannot take off an tempo-
rary burden of \$140,000,000 or \$150,
000,000 and lay on a permanent
burden or obligation of \$4,000,000,
000 to \$5,000,000,000 and call it
tax reduction. It would be a dan-
gerous political experiment. It
would defeat any party that would
undertake it."
