DR. SHERMAN LOUGHRIDGE

It is men more than buildings
and streets and utilities that make
cities or build up communities. Be-
hind every towering skyscraper. In
the background of every public en-
terprise, here is a personality that
dreamed and planned and built. Pro-
gress is the monument that these
men build for themselves. Graven
in enterprise and in development,
material and moral, the name of the
true builder must live.

Dr. Sherman Loughridge was a
builder. He was a force, probably
the most outstanding example of
personal force, in the growth of the
Grants Pass community. It is need-
less to say that his death comes as a
personal loss to every man, woman
and child here, and as a public loss
to the community, for sorrow per-
vades the very air today with the an-
nouncement of the death of this
good man. Children burst into
tears when they heard that their
friend had gone, for they knew him,
not alone for his professional skill,
but for his great kindness of heart
also.

It was good to know Dr. Lough-
ridge; grief at his passing is tem-
pered by the knowledge that he
must live long in memory because
of the good he has done, the charity
that went without ostentation, the
impression his character leaves behind.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
Population

Sofia, Jan. 24.—(I. N. S.)—Amer-
ican capital is showing renewed in-
terest in the commercial possibilities
of Bulgaria. Indications are that nu-
merous development projects in Sofia
and other Bulgarian cities will be
launched, with the active coopera-
tion, financial and technical, of
American industrial interests.

Thomas Shepperd, vice president
of the Ulen Company, of New York,
and Addison Ruan, an engineer of
the same company, are now in Sofia
negotiating with national and mu-
nicipal authorities. They are discus-
sing a plan for the reconstruction
and modernization of the city's pub-
lic utilities. The scheme includes
the water system, street railway sys-
tem, paving, sewerage and other util-
ities, including the construction of
adequate electric power houses.

If the negotiations are successful
it is expected the Ulen Company will
soon begin the work of rebuilding the
city's water supply. Successful com-
pletion of this will be followed by
development of other utilities.

That Bulgaria cordially welcomes
the incursion of American capital
and enterprise was demonstrated by
the impressive reception given Shep-
perd and Ruan.

They were received by Premier
Tsankoff, and it is expected they will
be formally presented to King Boris.

Greece's attempt to solve her refu-
gees' problem by colonizing them in
her Macedonian districts has caused
much dissatisfaction and unrest
among Russians and other national-
ities which now inhabit the districts
to which the refugees are sent. The
Rumanians, Macedonians and others
declare the influx of refugees is
crowding out the original inhabitants
and causing great hardship among
them.

It is openly charged by the resi-
dents of the districts to which refu-
gees are flocking that the Greek col-
onization scheme is a deliberate at-
tempt to persecute and harass the
Rumanian people. Greece, it is al-
leged, has instituted a reign of ter-
ror designed to exterminate the Ru-
manian element in the colonized re-
gions.

This policy of the Greek govern-
ment has resulted in strong protests
from Rumanian nationals. One of
the latest protests came from the
Macedonian students of Bucharest
and was sent to the league of na-
tions. This protest said:

"The Macedonian-Rumanian Stu-
dent Association has been the recipi-
ent of repeated appeals from our op-
pressed brethren in Macedonia in
which it is stated that the Greek au-
thorities, after they had closed all
Rumanian schools and other institu-
tions, after they had driven away the
entire Rumanian intelligentsia and
after they had imprisoned, maltreat-
ed or killed a large number of the
wealthier class of the Rumanian in-
habitants in those regions—in a
word, after the Greek authorities
had done all possible to stifle and
destroy every vestige of Rumanian
race feeling by the introduction of a
veritable reign of terror, the aim of
which was to exterminate the Ru-
manian element there, now the Greek
government has resorted to another
equally disastrous measure, namely,
the settlement of thousands of Greek
refugees in the districts and homes
of the Rumanian population, thus
crowding out, plundering, dispos-
sessing and murdering the original in-
habitants. We, representatives of
four Rumanian universities, raise our
voice and protests against this in-

human and barbarous policy of the
Greek government, which is employ-
ing all sorts of means and methods
for the suppression and annihilation
of all Rumanian schools, churches
and other legitimate institutions in
Macedonia. In this we know the en-
tire Rumanian people, 17,000,000
strong, is one with us in our appeal
to the great powers to interest them-
selves in the sad plight of our co-na-
tionals there. A stop should be put
to the systematic persecution of our
brethren by the Greek authorities in
Macedonia, and their rights, property
and lives guaranteed against any un-
bridled administration directed from
Athens."

into inadequate quarters or which
much be entirely omitted. All ap-
proaches from one floor to another
will be the inclined runway system,
instead of the steep stairways which
are now being used and which cre-
ate a large amount of confusion. Lav-
atories will be installed on each
floor.

The front of the building will be
entirely remodeled. Instead of the
present entrance, an imposing portico
effect is planned. Four huge col-
umns will extend the full height of
the building. It will present a most
pleasing appearance.

Mr. Tourtellotte will return to
Portland immediately and prepare
cuts of the floor plans and elevations
of the building which will be printed
in the Courier within a short time
so that the people of the district will
get an exact knowledge of the struc-
ture as it is being planned. The
school board has been working to
get the plans worked out before the
matter was brought out so that there
would be no misunderstanding as to
what is needed. The local business
men who have been consulted on the
matter have given their hearty en-
dorsement of the building program
and there seems to be practically no
opposition, due to the fact that the
school facilities in Grants Pass are
entirely too meagre to provide for
the people already here. With the
development which has started the
great need for the building is being
recognized.

It is desired that a bond election
be held as soon as the detailed plans
are received and preliminaries can
be accomplished. The board would
like to have the new part of the
structure completed by the time
school is out so that work could be
undertaken immediately on the re-
construction of the old portion. This
would have the building ready for
use with the opening of school next
September. The immediate need of
such a building has been pointed out
by P. P. Proctor, chairman of the
school board. He showed that when
the present structure was put up in
1912 there was a registration of 200
students there. This year there are
358 and these are forced to double
up in the assembly room, being in-
sufficient room to care for the num-
ber now attending. With an increase
no greater than has been experienced
in the past 10 years, he states that
the additions to the proposed struc-
ture would be undertaken in another
decade. It is for that reason that

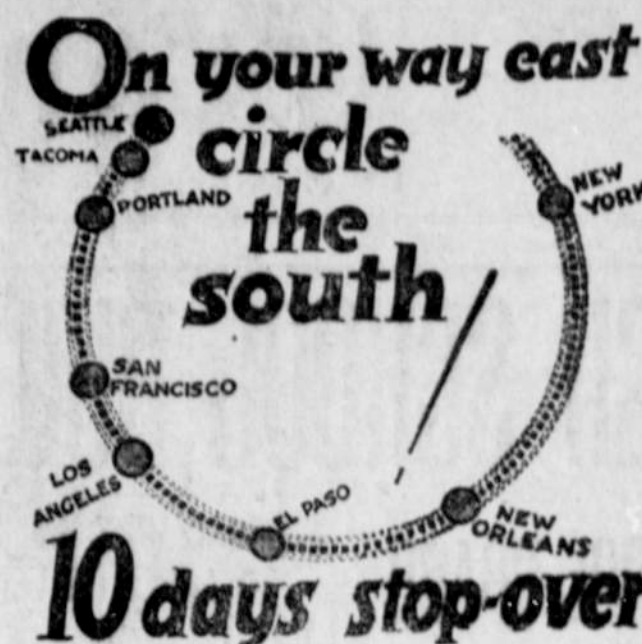
