INTEREST IN POLITICS

Every four years the equilibrium
of the American people is upset by
a presidential election. No matter
how peacefully the country may be
progressing up to the year for elec-
tion, all this is changed almost over-
night by a flood of oratory, of
charges and counter charges and of a
whole army of minor politicians. For
the American government is founded
on political interest and were it not
possible to have the country divided
into two camps, the election of a
president would be a decidedly diffi-
cult matter. In the few months pre-
ceding a campaign, the two great
political machines are busy organiz-
ing. Their efforts are felt in every
corner of the country for politics
have become an inherent part of
American life.

Tonight Josephine county feels the
first real impulse along these lines.
A call has been sent out for the for-
mation of the Josephine county re-
publican club, preparatory to opening
the 1924 presidential campaign.
Every man and woman who register-
ed as republicans should attend the
meeting to take their part in the or-
ganization. Not only is their inter-
est in who shall be president but
there is also interest developing in
the county officials. There is to be
a fight for every office, some of the
observers have stated, candidates al-
ready announcing their intention of
running.

The only way to keep politics free
and clean is to have the entire people
take an interest in them. This in-
terest is not developed by letting the
next person pick the candidates and
then tell who shall be voted for, but
is the outgrowth of national partici-
pation. We are concerned with who
runs our city, our county, our state
and our federal government. A study
of the qualifications of the men is
needed and this is possible only when
a person has the interests of his
country at heart. Recent government
scandals have showed that a greater
participation in the running of gov-
ernment is necessary.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents
at World Centers of
Population

New York, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—
With the radio movies looming on
the horizon, a transatlantic dirigible
line either from London or Madrid
to New York plans for aerial circum-
navigation of the globe, a full pro-
gramme for 1924 seems to be in the
making for those of a scientific turn
of mind.

Innumerable other advances, of
course, are being made both in Amer-
ica and abroad. Some of less spec-
tacular nature are none the less im-
portant. Among these are progress
in medicine and improvement of
methods in various well established
branches.

The successful isolation of living
tissue for a period of twelve years,
recently announced by officials of
the Rockefeller Institute for exam-
ple, reward for the illimitable pa-
tient experimentation and observa-
tion involved, whole new vistas of
medical lore and data for the study
and prevention of disease may come
to view.

On January 17 this living frag-
ment of chicken flesh completed its
twelfth year of "life in vitro" which
means that replying in a special
dish its cells have received and as-
similated food and discharged the
surplus precisely as though they
were part of the living, crowing,
scratching rooster—over a period of
a dozen years.

A normal question would be:
"What is the value of such an experi-
ment—what good does it do?"

Science answers that, for one
thing, it proves immortality! Not
spiritual immortality, but physical
immortality—for life could be main-
tained in vitro indefinitely, they as-
sert.

For another thing it permits pre-
cise and accurate study of cancer.
Cancer is a fatal foe to humanity be-
cause it is an uncontrollable growth.
With a cancer living in vitro science
can record, without guessing, the
effect of radium, of X-rays and of
other treatment.

The experiment doesn't however,
hold out any possibility of extending
human life indefinitely. Death, as
great scientists have said, is the
price we pay for our complex bodies;
chiefly because elimination is not so
successful as assimilation.

"Metal Mike" has just success-
fully guided a big British ship across
the Atlantic. His brain is composed
of a whirling metal disk, assisted in
its functionings by numerous gears,
eccentrics, and various other mech-
anical contrivances. His nerves are
fine strung wires. But he was able to
keep the commander Laconia within
one-sixth of a degree on her course
—much closer than any human hand
can steer her. "Metal Mike" is oth-
erwise known as the Sperry gyro
pilot. He is able to operate mainly
because of forces set up by rotation
of the earth. Captain E. T. Britten
the master, while appreciative of
Mike's capabilities and reliability,
nevertheless requires that a quarter-
master "stand by" at all times, in
case Mike gets metallic apoplexy.

When engineers decided recently
that a "dead spot" existed over Man-
hattan WEAF, local broadcasting
station, tried super-tubes. They pen-
etrated the resisting area with ease.
Prior to this a test proved the tubes
able to transmit radio waves to a re-
ceiving set located in the vehicular

tunnel under the Hudson River—
right through steel walls, water,
earth and other impediments.

Dr. Francis C. Wood, of Columbia
University, has announced the dis-
covery of a new type of X-ray tube
for the treatment of cancer. While
curative powers are not enhanced,
speed of the operation is reduced
from hours to minutes, it is claimed.

Skating Cap Is Ideal
for Out-of-Doors Girls

Those who indulge in winter sports
will find the Canadian skating cap of
cheviot yarn a comfort as well as a
becoming and stylish headress. Dur-
ing the war these caps were enthusias-
tically indorsed by fighting men, who
wore them under their helmets or as
sleeping caps. Knitted in cheviot,
these caps are ideal for the out-of-
doors girls. They can be knitted in
one day and the directions are very
easily followed.

Directions for Canadian skating cap:
Knitted with four needles. Cast on
100 stitches, thirty-six on one needle,
thirty-two on each of the other
needles. Knit two, purl two for three
inches. Knit plain for four inches.
Knit nineteenth and twentieth stitches
together on each needle. Knit one
round plain. Knit eighteenth and nine-
teenth stitches together. Knit one
round plain. Knit seventeenth and
eighteenth stitches together. Knit one
round plain. Decrease in this way
until only twenty-two stitches remain.
Run a thread through these and fasten
securely.

GENERAL NOW DISHWASHER

Was Major-General in Wrangel's
South Russian White Army

Denver, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—
From a major-general in the South
Russia army of General Wrangel to
humble dish-washer in the kitchen
of the Denver county hospital is the
three-year transition of Edgar W. S.
Nye, a native of Middleboro, Mass.,
and a soldier of fortune who has
traveled and fought in many coun-
tries.

Nye, first venture, as a lad of 15,
was in Panama, where he participat-
ed in a revolution, as an officer in the
regular army of that little country.

He enlisted in the Thirty-sixth
Massachusetts volunteer regiment
for service in the Spanish-American
war; later he joined the Philippine
Constabulary and fought insurgents
and bandits in Luzon. He spent sev-
eral years in the regular army of the
United States, and when the World
War broke out he entered the French
army service as an ambulance driver.
Following the armistice Nye went to
Russia and joined the forces that
were fighting the bolsheviks.

Nye is six feet tall and has the
bearing of a military man.

Nye has hobnobbed with Russian
royalty and married the Princess
Chervatoff, niece of Nicholas Cher-
votoff, last Russian premier under
the czarist rule.

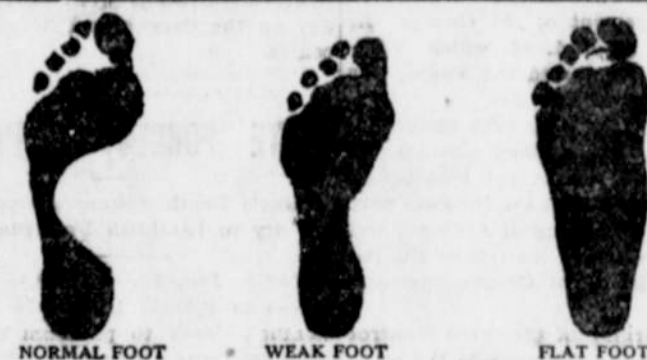
