OREGON WEATHER

KEEP SIXTH STREET OPEN

At the meeting of the city council
Thursday night, the tying up of
Sixth street traffic by freight trains
and the loud whistling of engines
within the city limits was brought
up. Nearly every member of the
council agreed that cooperation on
the part of the trainmen would help
end this nuisance. They also felt
that some action is necessary and a
letter is being forwarded to Superin-
tendent King to see what can be
done.

Complaints have been made that
there is a large amount of unneces-
sary whistling going on. The train-
men, through the letter to Mr. King,
will be asked to keep this to a mini-
mum as well as to keep the Sixth
street crossing open as much as pos-
sible. The attitude of the council
will receive the commendation of
every citizen of the city.

More housing room is needed in
Grants Pass. Practically every place
has been taken and newcomers al-
ways have a hard time finding a
place to rent. This brings up the
matter of an apartment house. Most
cities the size of Grants Pass have
at least one modern apartment
house, capable of caring for a large
number of families. There are a
number of apartment houses here
but they are not capable of accommo-
dating a large number of people.
There is an opportunity here for
some person who has had experi-
ence in that line.

It looks as if the Oregonian were

city park and fronting on the Pacific
highway. This strip of 45 feet will
be secured from T. M. Peeler for
\$500 and will be utilized for the
erection of an entrance into the
park. The present entrance is too
close to the bridge and is too steep
for safety, it was pointed out and
numerous collisions have resulted.
The new driveway will relieve this
situation.

A protest will be entered by the
city over the increase of power rates
in the city, the city attorney having
been instructed to take this matter
up with the public service commis-
sion. W. J. Coke appeared before
he council and asked that a strip
along the east part of D street be re-
paired to make the street passable.
He offered to do some work on that
part which lay outside the city lim-
its. The civic department of the
Womans club asked that the ordi-
nance requiring home owners to
clean up their curb parkings was
brought up.

The fire department will also re-
ceive a new fire whistle. They have
the greater part of the equipment
on hand and with the \$100 given by
the council Thursday night will be
enabled to install a whistle that will
be distinguishable at all times. Pre-
viously there has been trouble on
the part of the volunteer firemen in
hearing the alarms when they were
sounded.

LEGITIMATE USE OF CHAINS

Many Drivers Find Ways of Overdoing
Things and Get in Habit of
Driving Too Fast.

Chains have their legitimate use,
but as usual drivers find ways of over-
coming it. The latest is the habit of
driving too fast. Even the chain man-
ufacturers don't advertise that their
articles will guarantee motorists
against accidents, but drivers seem to
have a notion that the chains justify
greater speed. As a matter of fact,
the chains simply make the normal
speed of the car for wet weather safe.
If 15 to 20 miles an hour is the limit
for wet weather driving the chains will
make this speed practically safe. But
if the driver clips off 30 miles per
hour or over he must remember that
in event of need for a quick stop con-
ditions are about the same as though
he were caught going 20 miles per hour
without chain protection. Too much
confidence in chains is like getting
careless with the gasoline just because
there's a fire extinguisher in the car.
