How Bees Keep Warm.
Honeybees turn on the heat in their apartment houses at 57 degrees Fahrenheit. When it gets that cold, they form a compact spherical cluster. Bees on the inside of the ball become active and walk, wiggle and beat their wings to generate heat. The outer shell of the cluster is made up of bees that cuddle close and stay still. They furnish the insulation which prevents the escape of heat so effectively that there may be 75 degrees difference between the inside and the outside, only 4 1/2 inches away. Thousands of dollars are lost to American beekeepers every year, however, by bees working themselves to death in keeping warm this way.
