Salem, Ore., Mar. 13.—(Special)—George L. Baker, mayor of Portland, opened his campaign here last night for the republican nomination for United States senator with the upbuilding of Oregon as the foundation of his platform. The candidate sketched the latent resources of the state, the need of developing them and charged that Oregon has been neglected by the federal government due to the inactivity of the present senatorial delegation. Mayor Baker outlined a programme of progress for the state to which he promised to dedicate himself if elected.

INTERNATIONAL RADIO TESTS ON FOR TONIGHT

New York, Mar. 13.—(I. N. S.)—American radio fans will have an opportunity tonight to hear a program by the orchestra of the Hotel Savoy, London. It was announced by the Radio Broadcasting Magazine, which has arranged the international test with the British Broadcasting Company. The latter concern will send the program simultaneously from eight stations in England, Scotland and Wales from 6 to 7 p. m., and 8 to 9 p. m. Eastern standard time.

Efforts also have been made by the magazine to have American broadcasting stations cancel their programs during the two periods the British stations will send. In tests made several months ago, Canadian and American receiving sets were able to get programs from London as far west as British Columbia.

Work Going Good—

The construction of the eight and a half mile unit of the Redwood highway from the O'Brien school to a point a mile and a half the other side of the line is progressing in fine shape, states A. V.
