## BIGGEST MINING CAMP IN THE WORLD

Butte, Montana, holds the record as the largest mining camp in the world. Forty mines have produced 100,000,000 tons of ore, worth in excess of \$1,600,000,000. Present population 48,000.

Of the metals produced there were 7,200,000,000 pounds of copper; 825,000,000 pounds of zinc; 325,000,000 ounces of silver; 1,010,000 ounces of gold; and 42,000,000 pounds of lead. The ore blocked

out has a production of \$50,000,000 a year for many years to come.

It will be a short season for the placer miner on account of shortage in rainfall.

W. W. Dry is in town from his placer on Althouse Creek.

The Diamond R placer mine on Sucker Creek is being rigged up for work by Coos Bay parties.

The pumping plant at the Siskron mine gave way this week, but it is expected repairs will be completed and the plant placed in operation within a few days.

## GOOD NEWS FOR THE MINERS

The Secretary of the Interior has appealed to the chairman of the Committee on Mining of the Senate and of the House of Representatives for added appropriations for the War Minerals Relief Fund.

The balance left in the original appropriation will not suffice to adjust the remaining unsettled claims. Especially will this be true if the ruling of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia is sustained by the U. S. Supreme Court in regard to allowance for "money expended in the purchase of property" and "interest on borrowed money."

Following this appeal Senator Oddie, chairman of the Committee on Mining, prepared a bill authorizing additional payments under the War Minerals Act. It is anticipated that \$2,000,000 or \$3,000,000 will be necessary to meet the requirements of the bill.

There are many unsettled chrome and manganese claims in southwestern Oregon, growing out of the encouragement given by the Government to have those metals produced during the war period.

## FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS

The Senate Committee has increased the appropriations for the U. S. Geological Survey to \$1,747,193, and the Bureau of Mines to \$1,900,463.
