About 60 per cent of the seniors of the Grants Pass high school desire to attend some institution of higher learning, states Professor E. F. Carleton, who was making a survey at the high school this morning. Professor Carleton has visited 95 high schools of the state and has found from 60 to 75 per cent of the seniors expect to go on with their education. Of this number, fully 50 per cent must earn at least part of their expenses. The two Oregon schools are now working together in the lining of students up for college work and are not competing for students. Instead a survey is made and the seniors directed to that institution which seems best fitted for the work they desire to take up.
