THE EXHIBIT BUILDING

An exhibit building is now a certainty, following the official granting of a plot of ground for the purpose by the Southern Pacific. The need of such a building has long been recognized, in an endeavor to get tourists and others interested in the great variety of produce which can be grown successfully in this county.

The truth of the matter is that Mr. Walker brought two negroes, a married couple, who will act in the capacity of family servants. The man is to care for the car and the work around the yard while the woman is to do the housework for Mrs. Walker. A third negro came out but is not connected with the Walker planing mill. Mr. Walker expects to hire local labor as much as possible in the running of his plant. The negroes in question have been with the Walker family for 18 years and will remain here with them.
