

INTEREST MOUNTING HIGH IN COURIER FREE COOKING SCHOOL

SCIENCE OF COOKING HAS MADE REMARKABLE PROGRESS AIDED BY MANY LATE INVENTIONS

The June issue of the Volt, which is just off the press, deals with a timely topic which is, just now, uppermost in the minds of practically the entire feminine population of Josephine county. The subject is "The Advance in Cooking" and has to do with the remarkable progress made in the culinary art since the day of our cave-dwelling forbears and which has now culminated in the highly efficient method of electric cooking.

This number coming out as it does just in advance of the Courier Cooking School which takes place next week is of particular interest to every woman who plans to attend this interesting demonstration of modern cooking methods. A brief outline of the Medford and Klamath Cooking Schools is given and an announcement of the Grants Pass Cooking School appears in the same article. Several good photographs of the crowds who attended the schools in these cities are shown as well as pictures of the ladies who had the good fortune to win the first prizes in the bread-baking contests, thereby being richly rewarded to the extent of a \$235.00 super-automatic Hotpoint Electric Range.

Interesting facts and figures are cited throughout the article to show

how popular the use of electricity for cooking has become in the field of Copco operations. It is stated that there are now over 1300 electric ranges on the Copco system, which represents a gain of nearly 30 per cent since January 1, 1923. The reason for this exceptional gain is obvious when one reads in this article a paragraph which states as follows: "A study of all Copco domestic cooking consumers shows an average use per month for lights and cooking of 161 Kilowatt Hours at a cost of \$5.62 per month."

Not only is the domestic cooking situation discussed in an interesting way but the commercial use of electricity is also given considerable space. Interest in the Courier's Free Cooking school has increased to the point where early plans are being revised and arrangements are being completed to care for many more than had first been expected. J. J. Buchter was here today from Roseburg, where a school has just been completed and reports one of the most enthusiastic schools in the state. The attendance increased nearly 100 per cent each day.

The contest which is to be held on the last day for cake, pie and bread bakers appears to be drawing the major attention. The prizes which are on display in the window of the Holman furniture store are creating comment among the cooks, who are planning to have a try for one of them. There is a Hotpoint super automatic electric range for the woman or girl who can bake the best bread. For the second prize in this division a floor lamp has been donated by the Holman Furniture company. The Grants Pass Electric company is giving an electric washing machine as first prize in the cake division with an electric vacuum cleaner donated by the Vacuenger Electric company as first prize in the pie division. The Josephine county flour mill and the

Courier are donating additional prizes. These awards may be seen in the furniture store at any time.

The school will start on Tuesday, June 24, and continue until Friday, June 27. The Woodman hall has been secured and will be open at 1 o'clock daily, although the classes do not start until 2 o'clock. Early arrivals are assured of the best seats. There are absolutely no strings to the school or the contest and every woman and girl in Josephine county is invited to be present to take part.

The school will be conducted by Miss L. Carol Dangler, expert home economist, who was in charge of the successful schools at Medford and Roseburg. Miss Dangler was in Grants Pass today and stated that she has been meeting with exceptional interest by the women of southern Oregon and looks forward to a successful school here. On the second day of the Roseburg school 500 were in attendance and this increased daily.
