WOMAN GEOLOGIST CALLS WORK SPORT

Finds Delving Into Stones Fascinating as Gambling.

Cincinnati.—The scientific achievements recorded at the convention of the American Association for the Advancement of Science are not limited entirely to men. Out of a group of women who recently read papers, the most conspicuous independent research has been done by Mrs. Charles D. Walcott, wife of last year's president of the association. Her work has been in two fields, geology and botany. From rock strata high up in the Canadian Rockies she has hammered out trilobites 70,000,000 years old. Some of these stony remnants of early life showed organs still intact.

"It's the greatest sport in the world," she said. "The luck of a gambler is no more uncertain than the luck of a geologist. You crack 20 rocks and then perhaps in the twenty-first you find a marvelous specimen. I am a good collector of trilobites, for I have sharp eyes."

Not a Trained Geologist.

Mrs. Walcott is not a trained geologist, but having been up in the mountains 25 times with her husband, the discoverer of fossil life in the Cambrian range, she has taken an active part in his research work. With "Jonah" and "Little Jonah" their geological hammers, they have contributed valuable specimens to the world of science.

"It's not exactly what you might call a woman's life," Mrs. Walcott explained. "But I have found it of extraordinary interest. We have set up as many as 19 camps in four months. I know what it is to rise for breakfast at six in a tent pitched at an altitude of 7,000 feet, break up camp, then ride on horseback all day through rain with a complete sketching kit strapped to my saddle. We consider Cricket, my husband's horse, a very clever geologist. When he decides to stop at a rock we usually find that his instinct has been sound. We carry five cameras with us and have 15 horses in all."

But the geological research they carry on in the mountains is only one phase of Mrs. Walcott's work. She has developed a form of botanical study of her own. In addition to photographing and tinting wild flowers and plants as she finds them in their native state, she does water color sketches of them—not conventionalized, but botanically correct. Her work has caused so much interest among botanists that the Smithsonian institution expects to bring out a book with 500 of these nature studies.

Finds Rare Orchids.

"My husband's field of exploration has given me excellent opportunities to find rare and unusual plants," she said.

"I have all the Alpine flora to work on as well as the flowers that grow in the valleys. It is frequently difficult to reach the specimens for close photography. They may be growing on the fringe of a stream or right in the middle of a swamp. When it is windy I may have to wait hours to take my picture—until the plants stop swaying."

"In doing my water color sketches, I have to work at high speed. The blooms are apt to be very perishable unless you happen to catch them at the moment of their full perfection."

Her rarest find was the cypripedium, a little known orchid growing on the Mexican border. Much of her work has been done there. Because of the range of her husband's field of research, her selection is large and varied. He has followed the Cambrian formation from Mexico up to the Canadian Rockies, and her botanical studies stretch over the same area.

Mrs. Walcott has made a delicate water color of a spray taken from the magnolia tree near the White House door, which Mrs. Coolidge sent to her not long ago. Doctor Walcott is secretary of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington and his wife works there with him every day.

A FEW SWEETS

A different pudding will be found in the following combination:



Butterscotch Pudding.—Melt one cupful of brown sugar and two tablespoonfuls of butter over the fire in a frying pan; when dark brown pour over the mixture two cupfuls of boiling milk and simmer until dissolved and smooth. Meanwhile soak a thick slice of bread in cold water until very soft. Squeeze out all the water and crumble into bits. Pour the milk and sugar mixture over the bread and add the beaten yolks of two eggs, a little salt and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a pan forty-five minutes. Beat the whites of the eggs until stiff, add two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and the juice of half a lemon. Spread over the top and brown in a moderate oven. Serve warm or cold.

A Sweet Sandwich Filling.—Chop three or four tablespoonfuls of pecan meats, add grated maple sugar of the same amount and just enough cream to make the mixture of the consistency to spread. Sprinkle with salt and serve as a filling for white bread sandwiches.

Eggless Nugget Cake.—Cream one-half cupful of shortening with two cupfuls of light-brown sugar. Sift together two cupfuls of pastry flour, one-half teaspoonful each of soda, salt, and one teaspoonful of baking powder; add one cupful of raisins, the same of nuts, mix all together and add two squares of melted chocolate, melted over hot water. Bake thirty-five minutes.

Persian Cake.—Cut a large round sponge cake into five equal round slices like layer cake. Spread the first slice with strawberry, the second with plum and the third with raspberry jam. Lay the four slices together in the original form and press lightly together. Now cut the center from the cake, leaving a three-inch border. Put the piece taken out in a bowl with fruit juices to thoroughly soak the cake. Replace in the cavity and place the last slice over all the top, and cover with a tinted pink icing; decorate with citron, almonds and candied rose leaves.

Mary Succeeds on Main Street

THE PICK OF 70,000 JOBS

When the engineer corps was demobilized with thousands of young engineers and engineering jobs needing to be brought together, they devised a unique employment service. Jobless men were asked whether they would be willing to investigate positions for others while they waited for their own to turn up. They went heads up, shoulders squared, to interview building contractors, personnel directors and bosses. Near-hungry though they might be, they were representatives of the service on legitimate business, not beggars hunting meat tickets for themselves. They seldom went jobless long. Some man was sure to say: "Engineer yourself? Thought so. Why couldn't you tackle this job instead of Brown?"

Out in Fargo there is a young woman who knows all the jobs in North Dakota—and sticks to her own. In 1919 she went to Washington, D. C., to a government training school in public employment office technique. At that time it was easy to overhear something like this: "Oh, Mary Jones has technique, but you know no woman is ever trusted with the direction of an office handling men and women." Miltie Bove of Fargo took no part in these "sore-head" discussions. She was remembered after she had gone back home chiefly because she seemed to possess the old-fashioned faculty of attending to her own business and doing it well.

A year or so ago a visitor to North

Dakota came home praising a summer clubhouse outside of Fargo which the Business Women's club had opened. "There was a quiet little woman called Mrs. Bove who seemed to be largely responsible for its success," the visitor remembered.

A recent letter from Fargo brought fresh news of Mrs. Bove. Though most of the public employment offices were closed soon after the war, Miltie Bove's managed to keep on rendering service. Now, the only one in the state open the year round, it maintains supervision over the others. She interviews personally most of the 70,000 people who pass through the office annually. Ninety per cent of them are men—and outdoor men at that. "Find work in your home town. Grow with it. If you can outgrow it a bigger opportunity in a bigger place will always find you," she says to the women who come to her for advice.

RADIO HINTS

The tendency of the newest advance in radio art is simplicity of control. No longer is radio a complicated mass of wires and controls which discourage women in trying to master it. One of the best and simplest sets in the world is the one-tube, one knob set which takes two hours to assemble and hook up. With no manipulation all local stations can be tuned in quickly and long distance stations as far away as 2,500 miles can easily be reached. Most of these sets will not, however, support a loud speaker.

I am asked to explain the variations of a condenser. Variations in condensers and coils correspond

to changing the tension and weight of a piano string. Such an adjustment, by changing the tuning, changes what is called the "natural frequency" of the radio tuner or the musical string. This natural frequency is the rate of vibration which is the easiest for the tuned system. If a piano string is tuned to the frequency of 250 cycles per second, which is the pitch of middle C, it will give off a note of that frequency whenever it is disturbed or struck. That happens because tuning the string to 250 cycles is nothing more than making its natural frequency 250 cycles, so that its easiest, or natural rate of vibration is 250 cycles per second.
