NEWS TOPICS OF TODAY

It is fitting that Lieutenant Wade, who went the greater part of the round-the-world flight should be allowed to complete the journey with his companions. The announcement that a ship will await him at Nova Scotia, is a recognition of the fact that he has endured great dangers in the journey across the Pacific, through the Orient and into Europe, meeting disaster in Iceland with the end of the journey in view. If the other two planes reach Seattle in safety at the end of their long trip, the trip shall have been made with an average of 50 per cent for the planes. That none of the aviators were injured speaks well for the safety of flying today as well as for the ability of the aviators.

The campaign for the exhibit building is soon to be under way. Josephine county will next year have a place where the products, agricultural, mineral and industrial, can be exhibited so that the casual visitor can see at a glance just what

the assets are in the community. It is to be in a conspicuous place, and will be easy of access. The exhibit building move should have the aid of every person in the county to help make the building a reality.

RUM RUNNERS CARRY GIN IN LARGE CAKES OF ICE

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Advent of summer weather today has spoiled one of the latest, and by far the most ingenious, methods of bootlegging which has come to the attention of local prohibition enforcement agents. Large quantities of alcohol and gin, colorless liquids, are believed to have been smuggled across the Canadian border inside of cakes of ice, which have never been subject to examination on the part of the authorities. For at least two months this spring the plan was followed, it has been learned, and revenue agents are curious to know just how much liquor actually passed before their eyes aboard large automobile ice trucks.

Combination of the colorless liquids with the ice cakes, which had been hollowed out, made the ruse almost impossible of discovery, while the contents of the ice were prevented from spilling by a plate of clear glass neatly fastened over the top of each cake.

KILLED BY SECOND BOLT

STRIKING IN SAME PLACE
Albuquerque, Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The theory that lightning does not strike twice in the same place was dispelled recently by reports from the forests of New Mexico.

Some time ago Victor Ortega forest lookout in the Carson Forest was killed by lightning. Details were lacking. A report to the district office here has just been filed.

Ortega was struck by the first bolt about 3 o'clock in the afternoon in the lookout cabin on the top of Camillon Mountain. His leg was severely burned. While Mrs. Ortega was dressing the wound the second bolt crashed in, striking Ortega on the head. He was killed instantly.

A new model Oakland automobile will be brought to Grants Pass by J. K. Manuel, local dealer. Mr. Manuel left today for Portland in company with A. H. Brown, northwest Oakland dealer. Mr. Manuel will drive the new car from Portland and will put it on display at D. C. McIntyre's place of business.

BIG RETURNS MADE IN FLYING BUSINESS

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 6.—(I. N. S.)—A return of about \$500 a month is being paid on investments of \$2,000 in a new industry that is springing up on Lambert-St. Louis Flying Field, near here.

Every day, but particularly on Sundays' scores of passenger airplanes—all privately owned—hop off there to soar over St. Louis County, at \$3 a person for a fifteen-minute flight.

Inasmuch as the average plane can easily take up two, and some of them three passengers at a time, it earns from \$20 to \$40 an hour, for business seems to be rushing.

One of the larger planes on the field, owned by a retired farmer, earned \$110 for its owner on a recent Sunday, according to Q. E. Scott, manager of the Lambert-St. Louis Flying Field.

"That particular plane cost its owner \$2,000," Commander Scott said. "Since he purchased it, the ship has paid for itself twice and is not yet a year old."

Many of the planes that are housed in the two large hangars on the field are never flown by their owners, Commander Scott explained, because the owners know nothing about piloting an airplane. They employ professional pilots to take up their machines for them.
