MEMBERSHIP DRIVE PUSHED BY LEGION

In connection with the membership-drive being pushed this week by local Legionnaires along with the distribution and filling of application blanks for adjusted compensation, the executive committee of the local post of the American Legion Tuesday voted to offer a reduced membership fee effective during the week of August 4-9, both inclusive, in the amount of \$2.25. This fee includes local, state and national charges giving the new member full standing for the balance of the year, the initiation fee being waived.

Included in this also is the subscription to the American Legion Weekly, the national organization magazine. Former members who have dropped membership may reinstate themselves upon the same basis. This is an especially attractive offer of membership, and it is felt that ex-service men who approve the work the Legion has been doing for them should express their appreciation by joining the organization and adding their strength to it. The executive committee of the Legion which is handling the membership drive has purposely made the financial item of membership as light as possible, feeling that every veteran who accepts the benefits of the adjusted compensation act must approve the work of the organization since it was solely due to the fight waged by the Legion that the wide-spread propaganda of the war profiteers in the east was prevented from defeating the so-called "bonus" bill.
