THE SMITH-HUGHES COURSE

The introduction of the Smith-Hughes course in the high school of the city is to be regarded as the recognition of the agricultural advancement of the communities where agriculture is one of the most vital assets. Here it forms the very basis of the future growth of the valley and every stimulus which can be administered should be adopted.

The Smith-Hughes training is not to be confused with the training given by Oregon Agricultural college. The high school course gives the fundamentals in farm life and equips the student to assimilate more easily the technical training acquired if he continues on in college. For those unable to attend college, the four years of work in the high school will aid greatly in their work on the farm.

The course will be adapted to the needs of the adjacent communities. The instructor will be here this month to get acquainted with local conditions so that he will be able to intelligently instruct the boys in the work. He will work closely with the county agent in solving the problems encountered and the boys will receive the benefit of the experience carried on in the county. In fact, the course, by giving the boys a working knowledge of practical agriculture, will aid in building up the farm life of the community.

THE GRANTS PASS MEETING

The women who attended the meeting at Grants Pass under the supervision of Mrs. McComb and others from Oregon Agricultural College enjoyed an unusually interesting meeting, an account of which has appeared in the news columns of the Oregon Statesman. The title of the meeting was "The Homemakers' Institute," but it was more than that. It was a homemakers' institute where the women learned things that would help in their house work, but it was also a meeting where the women were encouraged to come out of their shells and take part in the great activities of the world about them.

Farm women have been too much in retirement. They have devoted their efforts to a single home, whereas a mother should be a mother to a whole community and should cooperate with the other mothers in being a mother to the world.

We need our mothers and our women folks generally to be progressive and active. We want them to keep thoroughly up-to-date, and the things they can do best are the things around their neighborhood

where they will not neglect their families but give a portion of their time to community service.

The meeting at Grants Pass was in a sense local, but that is all right. If we could have one in every county we would find every county responding splendidly for better things and enlarged activities for the women and a more considerate attitude toward them. We need the women in our community life; we need them to help direct community affairs, and we must equip them to do this work. Such courses as the one provided at Grants Pass help do this, and the women will go home with enlarged vision, a more set purpose and a better realization of their obligation towards their community life. The Oregon Statesman is very happy to see this movement take place.—Salem Statesman.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

London, Aug. 7.—(E. N. S.)—Prince Viggo of Denmark and his pretty American bride intend to prolong their holiday in England until October, when the prince has to return to his military duties in Copenhagen. They have been staying at Claridge's and more recently at Warwick Castle. The prince has announced that he intends to drop the royal prefix upon his return to his own country and he will be known simply by his rank of colonel in the Danish army.

The couple are extremely popular in London social circles, and much entertaining has been done for them by both English and American hostesses.

A new opera by Mr. Vaughan Williams entitled "Hugh, the Drover," which was produced in London for the first time this week, has as one of its main features a prize fight by the two principal characters.

The fight is not an aristocratic duel, with rapier, between two bewigged and powdered gallants; it is three rounds with fists! The critics insist that it is the most realistic fight ever seen on the London stage, and this between two world-famous operatic tenors!

During the rehearsals of this scene both Tudor Davis and Frederic Collier, who play the leading roles, suffered black eyes and are said to think that realism in art can be carried too far.

Perhaps if this craze for realism continues we shall see the leading characters in the opera of the future singing their way through a six-course dinner.

London is beginning to think there is some secret of coolness in the American cigar. During the recent heat wave the coolest men in London were the numerous American delegates to the International Advertising convention. No matter how exuberant the thermometer they seemed quite unconcerned; there was no mopping of their brows, no tugging at wilting collars; and they all smoked cigars—big green cigars.

The wives of these advertisers seemed to feel the heat much the same as London women; it was only the imperturbable smokers of cigars who were immune. London men are trying the cigar antidote—and with some success; women are already eyeing the cigar enviously; perhaps it will bring about the revival of the tiny cigars with which several women startled London last year.

Mrs. James Brown, of Chicago, who has taken Norfolk House, the Duke of Norfolk's wonderful residence, for the season, recently gave a dinner party, after which there was a cabaret—the first act from "La Boheme," sung by the Covent Garden stars; dancing to the famous Savoy Orpheans Band, and, finally, a violin recital by Jascha Hefetz; so

every taste or fancy was arranged for.

London hostesses have not yet carried entertaining so far in this direction as Mrs. Brown, who is certainly an inspiration to them. It is said that Mrs. Brown is considering taking a country house for two or three months when the London season ends. We should certainly like to see what new ideas this popular American hostess would introduce for the additional amusement of her guests during the sporting season.

Bitter warfare is raging in the houses of parliament over the proposal that peeresses in their own right should be allowed to sit and vote in the house of lords, which hitherto has been strictly a male preserve.

There are at present eight women members of the house of commons, including Lady Astor, our fair American M. P. for historical Plymouth. Lord Banbury, the head of the opposition, views with alarm the proposal that women should enter the house of lords. In a recent speech he declared that Lady Astor, as an instance, exercises a fascination over male members of the house of commons, and they find it impossible to treat her as an equal. "I do not say for a moment that it is by malice prepense, but she certainly does it unwittingly," Lord Banbury said.

If the bill is passed it will mean that 25 peeresses will be given entry to the house of lords.

We are now waiting for Lady Astor's reply to Lord Banbury's accusation.

ASSASSINS OF BRITISH WOMAN ARE CAPTURED

Mexico City, Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—The assassins of Mrs. Rosalie Evans have been captured, according to a report given out at the war department. The report came from General Robert Cruz, military commander in the state of Puebla, where Mrs. Evans was shot and killed near her hacienda last Saturday.

"I take pleasure in reporting that General Antonio Gomez Velasco, my chief of staff, informs me from Texmelucan that the assassins of Mrs. Evans have been captured," said the message from General Cruz.

"Valente Quintana, chief of the Mexico City secret service, co-operated efficiently in carrying out his mission to capture the assassins. The guilty men have been brought to the city of Puebla, adequately guarded. Accompanying General Velasco and General Quintana came the secretary of the British legation, who is well informed of the active efforts which have been made to clear up the crime. I shall continue to keep you informed."

GIRTH-CONTROL LADY

Long Beach, Cal., despite its millions made in oil, has always been rather proud of being a "Main Street" community. Thousands upon thousands of its citizens are retired farmers and merchants from the Mississippi valley. They still keep the neighborly point of view and the neighborly interests that they developed through years of hard work "back home." But they have leisure, and whenever a woman has time, we're told, she thinks about her looks.

This background was the incentive in starting a business in Long Beach conducted by two well-bred, much-traveled women. The business is nothing more nor less than a beauty shop. But it is owned and managed by a B. S. and an A. M. who substitute for the often shoddy atmosphere of such a shop common sense and culture.

The Master of Arts is Mrs. Robert Dee Hatcher, wife of a big lumber dealer of Alaska, who found the winters in the Far North too trying and wanted something to keep her busy. Years of newspaper and publicity training—she was once president of the Illinois Women's Press association—and of work with big women's organizations preceded this latest business. The women of Alaska sent her two years ago on a personal mission to Washington to ask the President to appoint the man whom they could trust as prohibition enforcement director. Her shop is a service station for the national women's foundation for health, which through women's organizations campaigns for such common-sense things as an annual health examination and properly fitting shoes.

Mrs. Hatcher's pet beauty cure is exercise! To prove the value of a simple before-breakfast setting-up, she acknowledges her sixty years, lets an occasional woman pull her curly white hair to be sure it isn't a wig, and demonstrates to selected audiences the value of what has recently been named "girth control." "The old masters knew all the secrets of color," she quotes her guide in an European art gallery, "but they did not seem to know much about Anna Tommy. Nowadays, to judge by the women on our streets, we've learned something about anatomy, but we sadly lack both judgment and art in application of color. We dab it on from the outside instead of from within!"

ARKANSAS HAS SIX CANDIDATES IN RACE

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—With six candidates for the democratic gubernatorial nomination in the field, Arkansas democrats will go to the polls August 12 to choose a nominee to succeed Governor Thos. C. McRae, who has declined to run for a third term.

Nomination in the primary in this state is equivalent to election, with the general election usually a dull formality. There is prospect, however, of more interest in the general election this year because John A. Riggs, editor of a Hot Springs newspaper, has announced he will make the race for governor as an independent Democrat if the winner in the primary does not meet with his approval.

The chief issues to be stressed during the campaign have been economy and retrenchment in state expenditures, additional financial aid for the public school system and construction of a state highway system.

The candidates in the gubernatorial race are: Lee Casart, of Lamar, former speaker of the house and former president of the senate; Jim G. Ferguson, of Marshall, now completing his third term as commissioner of mines, manufactures and agriculture; Senator Jacob R. Wilson, of El Dorado, president of the senate at the last regular session; Tom J. Terrill, of El Dorado, former secretary of state; John E. Martineau of Little Rock, judge of the first chancery district; Hans Williams of Hot Springs, federal food administrator for Arkansas during the war.

Besides a governor, all elective state and county officers are to be nominated at the August primary. Senator Joseph T. Robinson is a candidate for nomination for another term, without opposition; Congressman W. J. Driver, of the first district; Otis Wingo, fourth district; James B. Reed, sixth, are unopposed, while the incumbents in the other four districts are opposed by from one to two aspirants.

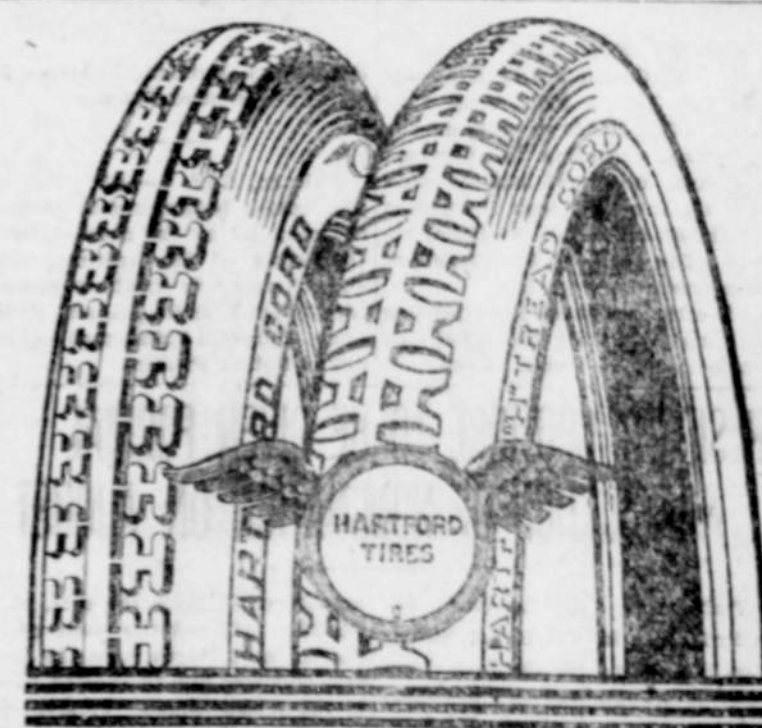
