STATIC

Notification ceremonies and the speech of acceptance by President Coolidge August 14th will be broadcast direct from Continental Memorial Hall, Washington, D. C. Frank W. Mondell, permanent chairman of the Cleveland convention will make the notification address. The ceremonies will be held at night to facilitate broadcasting to the nation-wide radio audience. The twenty-one stations which radiated the Republican national convention will be linked together by land wires and connected to the microphones in Washington.

John W. Davis, democratic candidate for president of the United States is an ardent radio fan. "The radio has been the most important development in the last fifty years," says Mr. Davis. "It will make a great change in campaigning. I thought the motion picture would be an important adjunct to campaigning, but the pictures do not compare with the radio in effectiveness." The broadcasting of the proceedings of the democratic national convention, which nominated Mr. Davis, apparently made a strong impression on him. The time of his acceptance speech at Clarksburg, W. Va., 8 o'clock in the evening of August 11th was fixed almost entirely with a view of reaching the largest possible number of radio listeners.

The U. S. department of commerce announces that China has awakened to the lure of radio. One of the leading Peking newspapers has installed a transmitting station and is broadcasting regular programs daily, consisting of educational talks, orchestral selections and vocal numbers. There is considerable demand for broadcast receiving sets among the Chinese and it is even said that the DX fever is rampant in the Celestial Republic. The seed sown by Dr. Mu, China's radio pioneer, seems to have fallen in good ground.

In the popular opinion, the wide variety of entertainment offered freely by big broadcasting stations far surpasses canned recitations and music of the phonograph, no matter how glorified the cabinet from which the latter may emanate or how faithfully to nature the reproductions of human voice and instrumental music which it sends forth. Even the chief attraction of the talking machine—that it may be turned on at will—fails to hold its former admirers. The lure of the air-borne speech and music appeals to all and the rush to procure and install receiving equipment goes merrily on. More than three million American homes have radio receiving sets and broadcasting is not quite four years old.

Who Paid the Fine?

Three race-course followers arrested at Aldershot on charges of drunkenness were remanded on bail of £1 each. One of them produced a wallet containing three £1 notes and left it as security. The men did not appear on remand, and the bail was estreated. Next day the wallet was shown to the judge, who recognized it as his property. It had been stolen from him at the race meeting.—London Mail.

Earth's Rotation

It is generally supposed that the nebular or planetesimal matter from which the solar system has developed possessed an original motion of rotation around an axis nearly at right angles to the plane of the ecliptic. The earth and the planets, in general, are supposed still to revolve and to rotate in the same direction as that of the rotation of the original mass.

Registers Salt in Sea

An apparatus has been perfected which automatically registers the amount of salt in sea water, thus making possible more accurate knowledge of the paths of ocean currents. It is also expected that it will aid in detecting the approach of icebergs. It is an electrical device developed by the United States bureau of standards.

Richards Will Write in Spite of Ruling

Vincent Richards, following his victory in the national indoor tennis championship, stated that his views on the tennis play-writer question were substantially the same as those of Bill Tilden, and that if it came to a choice between writing and amateur tennis next season he probably would follow Tilden's lead and continue to write.

He expects to be released from his present writing contract in time to be eligible for the American Olympic tennis team, but at present he has every intention of resuming as soon as the international event in France is over.

ILLINI THRIVE BY COACH GILL'S ZEAL

Orange-Blue Track Teams Famous Under Pilot.

Coach Harry Gill is preparing another of his famous University of Illinois track teams.

Gill is noted for the championship teams which he has turned out. When he first came to Illinois in 1904, he quietly assumed control of the team and started working on the youngsters. Illinois won its first track championship in 1907. Since that time, the Illini have led the conference nine times.

In the twenty years prior to the 1924 season, Gill's men won 93 of their 97 dual meets, while two were tied. In 1924, the Illini won the indoor conference championship, and the outlook is good for them to repeat in their outdoor meets.

The Illini are especially strong in the hurdles, pole vault, javelin and

shot put. Dan Kinsey, in the hurdles; Dean Brownell, in the pole vault; Milt Angier, in the javelin, and Fred Shildhauer, in the shot, are Illini aspirants for the American Olympic team.

Brownell holds the world's indoor record for the pole vault. This mark of 13 feet 5 1/2 inches was set in the conference indoor meet this year. He also holds the American outdoor collegiate record of 13 feet 2 inches made in the outdoor conference meet in 1923.

Dan Kinsey tied the world's record of 4000 yds in the 75-yard high hurdle event at the Illinois relay carnival this year.

Milton Angier holds the American record of 203 feet 9 inches in the javelin and the conference record of 198 feet 10 3/4 inches. Angier, while in high school, represented the United States at the Olympics four years ago. At that time he made the best American throw, placing seventh.

Fred Shildhauer has been tossing the shot near the 45-foot mark consistently this season. His best mark in competition this year was 44 feet 2 7/8 inches against Iowa. In the discus throw he has a mark of 141 feet and 2 inches. He threw the javelin 194 feet in an exhibition meet last fall.

England's Half in Cities
