SMALL FARMS AND IRRIGATION

The small farm is coming into its own in the Grants Pass Irrigation district. Berries so far seem to be the best producer for the man who has from one to three acres to farm. Returns of \$600 an acre have been reported already this season on these small tracts but it must be remembered that these returns have been possible only through the outlay of energy and foresight. It is not contemplated that every farmer can clear that much an acre. Returns of several hundred dollars per acre on small tracts is expected and can be realized, however, in almost every instance where real farming methods are used.

In an irrigation district of 19,000 acres where intensive methods such as these must be followed, the income each year can scarcely be realized. Manufacturing industries are relied upon in some communities for the payroll but in this district, farming will bring the biggest payroll of them all. After we have agriculture on a permanent paying basis, the other industries will follow as a matter of course.

Fishing Good on Rogue
"I should say that fishing is good in the Rogue river these days," declares J. C. Johnson, district attorney for Curry county. "The other day a boat trolling near the dead-line down near the mouth of the Rogue caught 22 chinook salmon. That was the catch of just one boat. The commercial fishermen are also doing well." Rogue river is considered by anglers as one of the best fish streams in America, and there have been more fights legal and legislative and otherwise, over the fish in the Rogue river between sportsmen and commercial fishermen than on any other waterway in Oregon.—Oregonian.

MONTANA INDIANS ARE INTERESTED IN POLITICS

Helena, Mont., Aug. 16.—(A. P.) Montana Indians, apparently aroused by the recent enactment of the Indian citizenship bill, are taking an increasing interest in politics. Several Indians, educated in the reservation schools, have filed this year for county offices, while Robert Yellowtail, three-quarter blood Crow Indian, of Lodge Grass on the Crow reservation, has announced his desire to attend the white mans congress at Washington as a representative from Montana. Yellowtail, who is 35 years old, completed his education by private tutoring after his graduation from the reservation schools. Encouraged by his tribesmen, he recently filed for congress from the second district, subject to the primary election August 26. He is opposing Congressman Scott Leavitt of Great Falls, who is completing his first term. Montana's Indian population is estimated at 13,000, of whom 7,000 live in the second congressional district. More than 2,500 Indians from the six reservations will be allowed to vote this year. Yellowtail, who gives his occupation as a rancher, announces he will base his campaign on his knowledge of the Indian problems.

WOMAN PRESIDENT? NOT YET. WORLD GETTING SMALLER. THREE AGES OF BARBARISM. STONE, BRONZE, IRON.

This is the political stage of "rosy reports." They pour in on La Follette, Davis and Coolidge. Coolidge is told that Ohio, Iowa and Kansas are already his. Davis is told that with the South and New York, Massachusetts, Illinois, etc., he is ELECTED NOW. La Follette's followers say they have "twenty-five States sure." The "rosy" days are pleasant, only some one is sure to be disappointed.

The Government has ordered a group of flying machines that can travel through the air, on the water and on land. Only one step remains, the amphibian and submersible flying machine pulling in its wings and becoming a submarine. That will come also.

John R. Voorhies, oldest officeholder, aged ninety-five, predicts a woman President. She will come, but not in fifty years.
