Fire Caused Shutdown—
The shutdown of the electric power yesterday afternoon for an hour was caused by a serious fire in the Gold Ray plant of the California-Oregon Power company. Three transformers were burned up, the fire having been caused by a short circuit. Because of the fire which necessitates a number of repairs, the power will be off here tonight between 12 and 12:15 o'clock. This city suffered only a slight delay yesterday as the company cut in on another plant as soon as possible.

DR. BILLICK TRIAL PROCEEDS
Sensation Sprung Wednesday When Miss Bartlett Testifies

The presentation of testimony for the state in the case now being heard in the circuit court in which Dr. E. J. Billick is defendant, charged with manslaughter, was completed yesterday afternoon, and the defense is now calling its witnesses. It is probable from the number of witnesses yet to be called that the trial will continue the balance of the week.

The charge against Dr. Billick grows out of the death of Blanche Pick, which occurred last April, the state alleging that death was brought about by the performance of an illegal operation. Dr. Benson, pathologist from the University of Oregon, who conducted the autopsy over the remains of the dead girl, was on the stand for the state practically all day yesterday on direct and cross-examination. Today the defense is calling a group of physicians, including three from Medford, the line of questioning indicating the wish to establish the cause of death by some other cause than one from an illegal operation.

The sensation of the trial came Wednesday afternoon when Miss Claire Bartlett, who had attended to Dr. Billick's office work for a number of years, testified on the stand that Dr. Billick had attempted to "buy her off." Miss Bartlett charging that Billick had promised her a trip to Honolulu if she would say that she was present when Miss Pick was in the office, and that an illegal operation was not performed. Miss Bartlett also testified that Dr. Billick told her that he "could buy off the officers." Asked by the state's attorney what officers the doctor had told her he could buy off, Miss Bartlett replied: "District Attorney Miller and Judge Thomas."

As the paper went to press, Dr. Chas. Sweeney of Medford, was on the stand and was to be followed by Drs. Kresse and Hayes, both of Medford, testifying for the defense.
