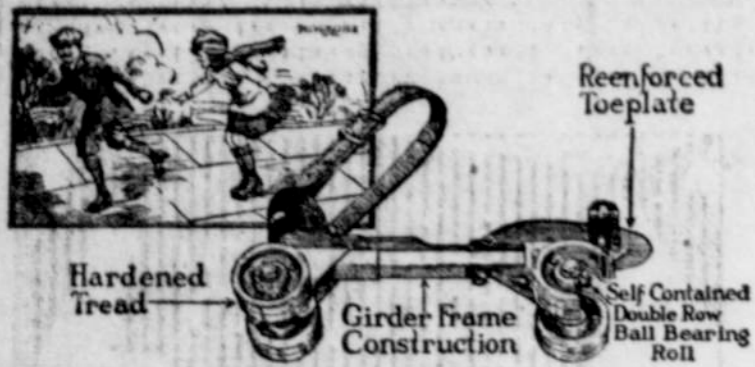

Will Give Demonstration— A demonstration of the gyroscopic propeller, invented by James A. Morrison, of Macedo, Cal., will be held on the river above the Savage Rapids dam next Sunday, provided it does not rain. The new propeller is a departure from the usual run of propellers as it embodies an entirely new principle. J. S. Bailey, who is associated with Mr. Morrison, states that a boat is now being built and will be placed on the river with the propeller driven by an automobile engine. He holds that the propeller will increase speed from 15 to 50 per cent and that fuel consumption will be cut down materially. They are seeking to place their article on the market.
