Pass about 10 a. m. Tuesday, on its
first trip north to Roseburg, where
it will circle the streets of that city

The car will pass through Grants
Pass several times each day during
the continuance of this test. This
is not a local but a national test
which is being run by every dealer
throughout the United States this
