OREGON WEATHER

Pacific Coast States: The indications are for fair and cool weather in California and for considerable cloudiness, occasional rain, and temperature somewhat below normal in Oregon and Washington.

OREGON LOSES EGG BUYERS

U. L. Upson, formerly of Grants Pass, is the man who developed a New York market for Oregon eggs, shipping them there by the carload in behalf of the Oregon producers, for whose association he was the manager.

When the state income tax bill was passed by the Oregon legislature a year and a half ago, the Lewis-Mears Company informed Upson that it was sustained by the vote of the people they would be compelled to close their Oregon office and cease buying eggs in Oregon, due to the fact that the law would bring the operations of their entire national business under review of the Oregon tax officials, a nuisance they were unwilling to endure simply for the small ultimate profit they could expect to make on Oregon eggs.

and exhibited at various points. Twenty thousand copies of the Redwood Route strip map have been distributed. The "Call of the Open Road Tours" was inaugurated which brought hundreds of motorists over portions of the route.

A. D. Lee, speaking for Del Norte county pronounced the Redwood Highway the most entrancing and beautiful highway in the world. Along the nearly 500 miles of the route there are over 100 miles of redwoods the oldest living things in the world, ocean beach, mountains, cultivated fields and vineyards, rushing streams. From a poll of the tourists it was discovered that of the 9000 eastern tourists passing over the route this season there were three things prominent in their selection of the west for their vacation: See California, See the Pacific and See the Redwoods, but of these three the redwoods gave the greatest thrill.

He paid a tribute to the road building of Oregon and stated that Oregon has the most miles of paved highways in comparison to population of any state in the union.

Ralph Duncan, druggist of Willets, stated that the months of June, July and August were their best business months, due entirely to the tourist travel.

H. D. Norton, president of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, reviewed the progress of road building on the Oregon end of the Redwood highway, and Edw. Miller, member of the board of directors of the highway association, speaking for Josephine county, gave a glowing account of one of the attractions of the Redwood route—the Oregon Caves.

Representatives of other California counties and also of Coos and Curry counties in Oregon spoke.

The annual election of officers resulted in the selection of P. L. Young of Eureka, president; W. P. Cochran, San Francisco Bay region, vice-president; Bob Austin, Ukiah, secretary and manager. Edw. W. Miller of Grants Pass, and A. D. Lee of Del Norte are directors.

An elaborate banquet was served the guests and participated in by many of the Crescent City people, the total number served being close to 200. The Masonic hall, where the banquet was served, was beautifully decorated with an abundance of dahlias, such as only Crescent City can grow. Many of the blooms measured a foot across. The banquet was well planned and excellent served and those who had it in charge deserve great credit.

Dancing followed the adjournment of the convention.

STAR CARS MAKE GOOD RECORDS IN HAND TEST

Surprising statistics came to light when results were announced by the Star Motor company on the 100-hour test which ended last Tuesday. Los Angeles reported attaining the high average of 50.8 miles per gallon of gasoline for the entire trip. San Francisco reported the next highest average of 44 miles to the gallon, and Sacramento ran third with 40.4 miles.

Other tests on the Pacific coast ran from 35 to 40 miles per gallon. Smith's Garage, of Grants Pass, averaged 37 1/2 miles, but their route was much more severe, in that they were compelled to travel over mountains where the altitude demanded more gasoline. They were also the only dealers on the coast to seal their transmission gears, which compelled their car to make the entire trip in high gear.

A meeting of the Oregon Star dealers will be held tonight at Roseburg, where Norman Devaux, president, and E. H. Tuller, general sales manager, of the Star Motor company will preside. Gladwin Smith and Monte Hamaker, of the local Star agency, expect to make the trip this afternoon to attend.
