RED CROSS REPORT MADE

Washington, Oct. 20.—(A. P.)—More than 40,000 trained nurses are now enrolled in the nursing service of the American Red Cross, according to the organization's fiscal report for the year ended June 30, made public today. This corps of qualified nurses, the report added, forms a nursing reserve immediately available in time of war, epidemic or disaster.

Expansion of the Red Cross program of supplying nurses to communities having no other public health agencies, the report said, has been carried forward during the year with the placing of more than 1000 nurses in as many localities. In addition to this number, five nurses maintained by a fund bequeathed by Miss Jane A. Delano, war-time director of the Red Cross nursing service, are on duty in isolated sections of the country.

First aid work by the organization, the report continued, was expanded in an effort further to reduce the accidental deaths among workers in mines, factories and groups of people everywhere. More than 500,000 railroad employees have been given Red Cross first aid instruction in the last 10 years, and "experience shows that the accident rate among industrial workers who have had this instruction is nearly 75 per cent less than among the uninstructed."

The number completing first aid courses last year was 10,000, or 4000 more than the previous year, and demonstrations in first aid were given to approximately 146,000 people. The Red Cross life-saving corps now counts about 50,000 members, all of whom are well trained and able to rescue and revive a drowning person.

Interest in the course in home hygiene and care of the sick also has greatly increased. The course aims to teach preventative measures; how to keep well; simple nursing methods of caring for the sick in the home, and also to assist in reducing infant mortality by instruction in the care of infants and children.

This year the standard of health was raised in the homes of 135,496 children who were given regular nutrition instruction in the schools. Thirteen thousand mothers attended nutrition classes, 35,500 home visits were made and consultations held on special dietary needs, and more than 1100 schools were assisted in furnishing hot lunches at noon.

The "Fitness for Service" program of the Junior Red Cross links its closely with the health services, as every one of the 5,452,745 school children who hold a junior membership is being taught the importance of proper food and adequate exercise. The slogan "every child a swimmer" has been adopted, and swimming instruction is being carried out enthusiastically in schools everywhere.

Following its custom, the Red Cross will hold the annual roll call this year from Armistice day to Thanksgiving day, Nov. 11-27.

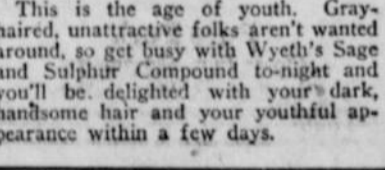
