## CHURCH SUPPORT IS SOUGHT

### League of Nations Wants Help to Fight Drug Evil

Washington, Oct. 21.—(United Press)—Earnest support of churches and church organization for the American plan for world-wide suppression of the "drug evil" before the International Opium conference in Geneva in November is sought by the Federal Council of Churches.

The council calls upon Christian America to support, by thousands of resolutions, the famous "American policy" calling for total extirpation of opium plants except to meet medical and scientific needs. The petitions will be presented to the world conference by Bishop Charles H. Brent one of the three American delegates appointed by President Coolidge. Congress has appropriated funds for the expenses of the delegation.

The American delegates, the federal council says, will make a strenuous fight for control of the traffic in habit-forming drugs, but leaders in the fight believe that is essential for the world to know that they are backed by the American people.

The International Opium conference was summoned by the League of Nations, chiefly through the efforts of Stephen G. Porter, then congressman who persuaded the league commission to adopt the "American policy."
