Lake Has Good Day—The weather at Crater Lake Sunday was ideal and there was no snow in the road except a little between government camp and the lodge, according to Medford people who returned from a trip to the lake last evening. About 20 cars of sight-seers visited the lake during Sunday.—Medford Mail Tribune.

Birds Invade Fields—Thousands of ducks and geese from the north are invading the Tule lake grain fields, 40 miles south of Klamath Falls, and approximately 1000 acres of wheat, barley and oats have already been cleaned by the game birds. J. F. Hoskins, an extensive lease-land farmer in the lake bed section, reports 120 acres of barley cleaned by ducks and geese in five days' time last week. A race has developed between 12 to 15 combined harvesters with hundreds of thousands of water fowl for the remaining standing grain in that section, amounting to 6000 acres.

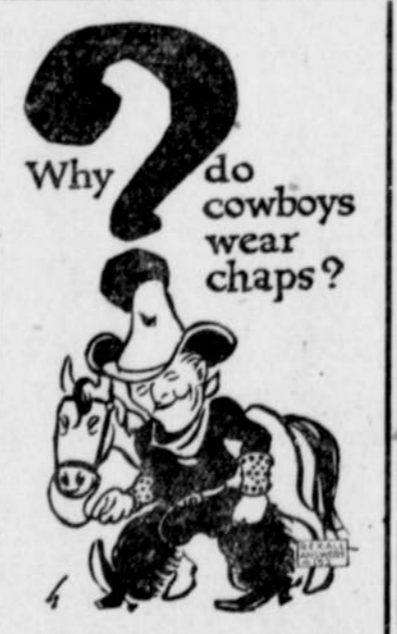
