ROAD BUILDERS ARE TO GATHER IN SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—San Francisco is preparing to entertain the road builders of the nation.

Officials who are responsible for carrying forward highway construction—state highway commissioners and engineers and officials and engineers of the federal government—will gather in San Francisco, Nov. 17th to 20th, for the tenth annual meeting of the American Association of State Highway Officials, the first convention of the association to be held west of the Rocky mountains. Every state in the union and Hawaii will be represented.

In addition to the state delegations, engineers of the United States Bureau of Public Roads will join in the four day discussion of problems of highway construction, administration and finance. Many noted engineers and officials will be among the speakers.

On Monday morning, November 17th, the visiting commissioners and engineers will be welcomed to California by Mayor James Rolph, Jr., of San Francisco and Governor Friend W. Richardson. Fred R. White, chief engineer of Iowa and president of the association, will deliver the annual address.

Among the speakers on the program will be Chairman Harvey M. Toy, of the California commission, who will discuss: "Needed State and National Highway Legislation for the Public Land States," a subject in which he is deeply interested and which is of importance to the entire west.

R. M. Morton, state highway en-

gineer of California, will deliver an illustrated talk on, "Convict Labor in Highway Construction."

Among other speakers will be: Howard C. Means, chief highway engineer, Utah; Thomas H. MacDonald, chief, bureau of public roads, United States Department of Agriculture, who will urge uniform traffic laws; Frank T. Sheets, chief highway engineer, Illinois; James Allen, state highway engineer, Washington; Dr. L. I. Hews, bureau of public roads; R. W. Crum, Iowa highway department; Charles M. Babcock, Minnesota.

Unique entertainment features, including special parties for the visiting women, have been arranged by a committee headed by Harvey M. Toy, chairman of the California commission. He will be assisted by Commissioners N. T. Edwards and Louis Everding, State Highway Engineer R. M. Morton and highway officials from Oregon and Washington and engineers of the California highway department.

The annual banquet will be held at the St. Francis hotel, Wednesday evening, November 19th. On Thursday, the visitors will be guests of the Down Town association at a luncheon. There will be a special Italian dinner on the opening night. A visit to Chinatown and motor trips over the state highways of the bay district, will also be in the program.

Delegations coming from the southern states will be met in Los Angeles and escorted to San Francisco by automobile. Other parties, including 30 engineers of the bureau of public roads, will enter the state from the north and motor from Sacramento to San Francisco.

At the conclusion of the convention, the California highway department, assisted by the California State Automobile association and the Automobile club of Southern California, has planned a motor trip for the entire convention from San Francisco to Los Angeles. This will give the visiting officials and their families an opportunity to see many miles of California state highway and a considerable section of the state.

Nation-wide interest is being taken in the convention because its recommendations with regard to pending federal aid legislation are expected to have great weight with congress. Western engineers and officials are emphasizing the importance of the meeting to this part of the country. They see in it, opportunity to acquaint influential highway officials of eastern states with western construction problems, such as the completion of transcontinental routes through the public land states, building and extension of forest highways and the like.

General sessions will be held at the Hotel St. Francis and the numerous committee meetings at the Hotel Manx.

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK NOVEMBER 17-23, 1924

By designation of the president of the United States the week beginning November 17 will be celebrated as Education Week, for the purpose of bringing educational problems to the attention of the people. Churches, lodges and civic associations are asked to co-operate with the National Education association, the American Legion and the United States Bureau of Education in making this observance a nation-wide success.

The following program is suggested:

Constitution Day—Monday, November 17, is designated as Constitution Day, the central idea being "The Constitution—The Bulwark of Democracy and Happiness."

Patriotism Day—Tuesday, November 18, "The United States Flag is the living symbol of the ideas and institutions of our republic."

School and Teacher Day—Wednesday, November 19, "The Teacher—the guiding influence of future America."

Illiteracy Day—Thursday, November 20, "Informed intelligence is the foundation of representative government."

Physical Education Day—Friday, November 21, "Playgrounds and athletic fields mean a strong, healthy nation."

Community Day—Saturday, November 22, "Service to the community, state and nation is the duty of every citizen."

For God and Country Day—Sunday, November 23, "Religion, morality and education are necessary for good government."

The tentative program and other material prepared for convenient use during Education Week will be mailed free on request to Bureau of Education, Department of Interior, Washington, D. C.

Saturday, November 22, has been designated as Community Day in the American Education Week program for 1924. It is hoped that there will be a community meeting that day or evening in every school house in America. The subjects suggested for discussion are of particular value to rural communities, the central idea being "Service to Community, State and Nation is the duty of every citizen." Here is a suggested program:

1. Equality of opportunity in education for every American boy and girl.
2. Better rural schools.
3. Adequate public library service for every community.
4. A community's concern for education measures, its interest in its own future.
5. Good roads build a community.

Slogans—Get acquainted with your neighbor; A square deal for the country boy and girl; Children today—Citizens tomorrow. Teachers, ministers and community leaders will add or subtract from the above program or modify in such a way as to meet local conditions.

FOREST PRODUCTS UTILIZATION CONFERENCE NOVEMBER 19TH

The conference on the utilization of forest products, called by the late Henry C. Wallace as Secretary of Agriculture, will be held in Washington on November 19 and 20, as originally planned, announces Acting Secretary of Agriculture Howard M. Gore.

Chief Forester Greeley in an announcement just issued declares that the late Secretary Wallace regarded the reduction of timber waste as one of the most important phases of forest conservation and felt that much could be accomplished in this direction by calling together the leaders in forest-using industries and in the principal groups of wood consumers for a thorough discussion of the subject.

"Officials of the United States Department of Agriculture believe that Secretary Wallace's great service to forest conservation can be commemorated in no better way than by carrying out the conference at the time and in the way he planned," said Mr. Greeley.

"The Government is taking the lead in this movement only so far as its help and cooperation are needed to bring the various interests together. It is in reality a cooperative industrial movement. We hope the conference will end in an organized attack by forest industries and consumers on those points where timber waste bears most heavily on industrial profits and on the public pocket book. Investigation has already done much to expose these points. Fortunately to cut down these wastes will not only be in the public
