Loose Cartridges Explode—Companion Is Injured

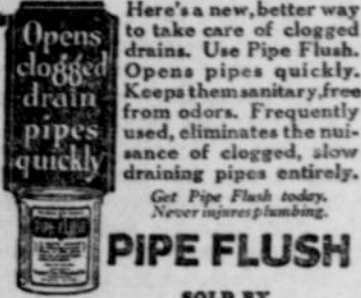

OREGON AND AGGIES TO MEET TOMORROW

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 19.—(Special)—Oregon and the Oregon Aggies meet on the gridiron Saturday for the twenty-eighth time. Of the 27 games played Oregon has won 16 and the Aggies five. Six resulted in tie scores.

Athletic relations on the football field began in 1894, the Beavers trouncing the Webfooters 18 to 0. The Aggies won again in 1897, 24 to 5, and did not win thereafter until 1927 when they amassed four points to none for the varsity. Then followed a 10-year period without an Aggie victory. In the war year, 1917, O. A. C. took the Oregon eleven into camp 14 to 7 and last year won 6 to 0 in a brilliant game, featured by hard fighting and a great run by Price, Aggie quarter.

Oregon has an aggressive team, which will try every play in their repertoire Saturday. The Anderson-Jones-Vitus-Terjesen combination is a hard one to stop.

Despite the wonderful improvement in the Oregon team since the start of the season, the Aggie supporters are hopeful of repeating their last year's performance. Backers of Schissler's eleven are counting on the long kicking of Tebbis to put the Beavers in position to score. Schissler and his educated toe are also figured to aid the Corvallis eleven when in scoring range.

Against these two men Maddock has Anderson to do the punting and Reed to kick from placement, if necessary. A dry field will materially aid the Oregon team, but against Washington and Idaho the Webfooters demonstrated that they could hold up on a soggy gridiron.

JAPANS ATTITUDE IN CHINA IS SHOWN

Osaka, Japan, Nov. 20.—(U. P.)—The growing gravity of the Chinese situation is naturally attracting increasing attention in Japan. Discussing the situation, the Japanese press generally holds moderate views and supports the government in its decided policy of "wait and see."

The pro-Chang policy advocated by a body of Japanese opinion may be considered as one method, but it is a mistake that real aim can be achieved by this, so regards the representative press. The positive help given to Marshal Chang Tso-lin will induce a general situation detrimental to Japan's interests in China.

So far as Japan's economical interests in China are concerned, it is essential for Japan to cultivate the friendship of Chinese people generally, if she desires to promote them. Japan dreads the outbreak of anti-Japanism in China, mainly because it threatens to affect her economic interests to a serious extent. The Chinese people hold the troops, he they Chihli or Mukden, in abhorrence. In their eyes, military party is their common enemy. This being so, any country who desires to help the Chinese military party and aggravate the situation must be fully prepared to incur the general hostility of the Chinese people. This fact must be taken into the most careful consideration by the Japanese authorities, so argues the influential press.

The only course open to her is quietly to watch developments. The fact cannot be denied that in the past Britain, America, and other countries have often circulated reports as if Japan were wire-pulling in the background of Marshal Chang, with the result that a good deal of misunderstanding has been created in the foreign minds generally. There may be no occasion for apprehension if really Japan's attitude is above all criticism, but in reality of international relations which are very complex and susceptible to misgiving, it would be wise to use every care to avoid all possibility of misunderstanding. The misunderstandings have largely arisen from suspicion of a certain

connection of the Japanese army with the war lord of Mukden.

The misunderstanding has two causes: One is entire ignorance on the part of certain critics of the relationship between Marshal and Japan, and the other is an attempt on the part of critics deliberately to injure Japan's position in China. The papers proceed that for those who deliberately misconstrue the relations between Japan and China, nothing can be done, but that with regard to the misunderstandings arising from ignorance of the fact it is important that everything possible should be done to remove it by setting forth the real facts of the case. In any case Japan must conscientiously refrain from all actions which may possibly give rise to misunderstanding about her attitude.
