ENGLISH LABOR GAINS VOTES

Liberal strength shrunk at the polls from more than 4,000,000 to less than 3,000,000, and in the house this middle party withered to less than 40 members.

In consequence of the strange harvest that sprung from the votes of the nation, the advocates of electoral reform are pushing pens and using vocal chords industriously. The movement for introducing proportional representation has taken on fresh vigor. The Proportional Representation society has pointed out that had the system it supports been in use, the Tories would have only three-fourths of their present parliament members; Labor would hold more than 200 seats instead of 158, and the Liberals would have 109 members instead of a mere omnibus load of less than 40.

U. S. AND STATE ASK FOR INCOME TAXES

December 15 is the last day for paying the final installment on federal income tax for 1923, according to announcement by Clyde G. Huntley, internal revenue collector for Oregon. Those who are delinquent after Monday will be penalized. Collector Huntley believes that because of the approach of the Christmas season many of the 3,000 delinquent have overlooked their obligation to Uncle Sam. The fourth installment on this year's state income tax will be delinquent after December 20.

Tracing Arabian Numerals

Arabic numerals were introduced into Spain about the close of the Tenth century by the Moors or Arabs, who got them as early as the Sixteenth century from the Hindus. Before that time, little is known about them. They did not come into general use in Europe until the Sixteenth century.

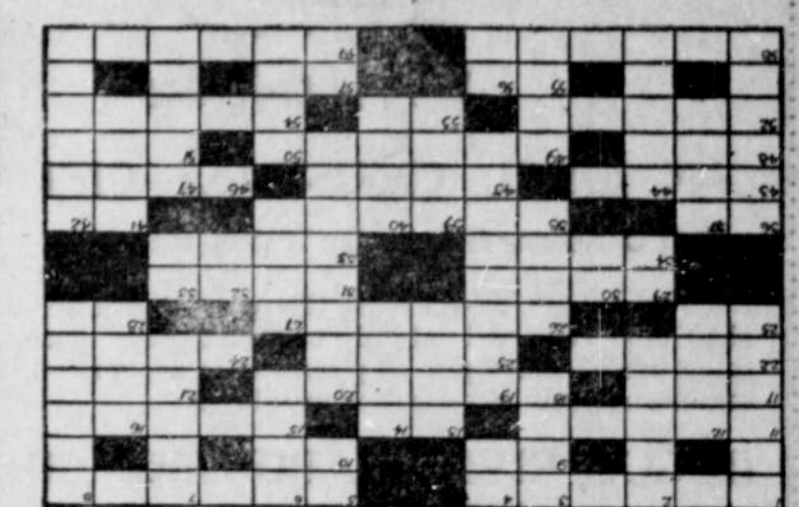
