Angels bats rough up Mariners 9-3

ANAHEIM, Calif. — After a big game with the bats, the Los Angeles Angels went home worried about one of their

Kole Calhoun and Andrelton Simmons each had three of Los Angeles' 15 hits Tuesday night, but starting pitcher Garrett Richards left in the third inning of a 9-3 victory over the Seattle Mariners because of irritation in his right forearm.

Richards has been plagued by injuries during his career and this was just his second start since coming off the disabled list after being sidelined by a left hamstring strain. He is scheduled to have an MRI on Wednesday.

"It's tough. Just hoping for good news," Calhoun said. "He's been battling for the better half of a couple years. Hopefully, everything comes back all right."

Calhoun and Albert Pujols both homered for the Angels, who have won three of four. Calhoun and Simmons each had

Simmons, seeking his first All-Star appearance as one of five candidates in online balloting for the final AL spot, hit a go-ahead double in a four-run fourth.

Seattle All-Star Mitch Haniger hit a three-run homer in the first for a 3-0 lead against Richards, who allowed three consecutive hits to begin the

game. He exited in the third while pitching to Nelson Cruz.

Richards' velocity was down. After a 92 mph pitch, a trainer and Angels manager Mike Scioscia went to the mound, and the right-hander quickly walked off the field.

"Pregame warmups, in talking to (pitching coach Charles Nagy), he was a little erratic," Scioscia said. "Velocity looked good and his slider was good. His command was a little off. I think you can see that after he got through the first inning, the second inning was OK, but the third inning the velocity dropped and the quickness wasn't there.'

Richards gave up three runs and four hits in 22/3 innings, Noe Ramirez (4-3), Cam Bedrosian, Jose Alvarez, Hansel Robles and Taylor Cole combined to pitch 6 1/3 shutout innings in relief.

"We've had our share of bullpen games that aren't by design," Scioscia said. "We've had a lot of times where these guys have come in the second, third or fourth inning and kept us in the game. All those guys came in and did a great job. I think Taylor Cole at the end gave us two innings to give some other guys a night off and that's helped a lot,"

Mariners starter Mike Leake (8-6) allowed seven runs — five earned — and 11 hits in four innings. Seattle has lost three of four.

"He's not locating," manager Scott Servais said. "That's his game. You got a feeling they were on his pitches, and he didn't have enough to slow them down. He's faced them back-to-back outings, and they had a good read on what he's trying to do. He's a big part of what we're doing in the first half and we just have to get him back on track."

Serena reaches women's semifinals

LONDON — There are moments in which nothing at all seems different about Serena Williams, moments such as when she unleashed a 109 mph service winner to even her Wimbledon quarterfinal at a set apiece, leaned forward and yelled, loudly as can be, "Cooome ooon!"

Or when, about 10 minutes later, she stretched for a lunging backhand winner it actually happens, it still to break a love and take control of the third set, then raised a fist, figuring a berth in her 11th semifinal at the All England Club was close at hand.

And after Williams came up with a comeback to beat 52nd-ranked Camila Giorgi of Italy 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 on Tuesday, she headed off Centre Court with her right index finger aloft.

Yes, no matter what the rankings or seedings say, no matter how long she was away, Williams still looks capable of playing like someone who's No. 1, just about 10 months after having a baby.

"Everything right now is a little bit of a surprise. To be here. To be in the semifinals. I mean, I always say I plan on it, I would like to be there, have these goals," Williams said. "But when is, like, Wow, this is really happening."

So what if she's still getting her game in gear? So what if Giorgi

wouldn't seem to miss while moving out to that early lead?

Williams never was worried about losing.

"It's weird. Sometimes I feel, 'Man, I'm in trouble.' Sometimes I feel, I can

fight.' For whatever reason, today I was so calm," said the 36-year-old American, who has been wearing compression leggings as a precaution after a bloodclot scare following her daughter's birth. "Even when I was down the first set, I thought, Well, she's playing great. I'm doing a lot of the right things."

Asked whether that might represent a new way of looking at things, Williams smiled.

"No. Just to be clear, that was just today. I mean, I'm hoping this is, like, a new thing," she said. "Honestly, I highly doubt it."

Next up for Williams as she tries to earn her eighth title at the All England Club and 24th Grand Slam trophy overall will be a match Thursday against No. 13 seed Julia Goerges of Germany, a 3-6, 7-5, 6-1
