Notice is hereby given that the Baker County Clerk has received a Notice of District Measure Election proposing Bonds to Improve Safety, Expand Vocational Opportunities, Address Enrollment Levels. The ballot title meets the requirements of the Oregon Constitution. The certified ballot title is as follows:

Caption: BONDS TO IMPROVE SAFETY, EXPAND VOCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES, ADDRESS ENROLLMENT LEVELS

Question: Shall Baker School District improve safety, efficiency, vocational opportunities and build new elementary school by issuing \$48 million in bonds? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: The District has been awarded a \$4 million state grant if these general obligation bonds are approved. Bond and grant funds are expected to:

- Make safety improvements at all schools, including secure entries and key card systems to better control access.
- Make energy efficiency improvements at all schools, including upgrading heating and ventilation systems at Keating and Haines.
- Build new elementary school to address elementary enrollment levels and provide space for hands-on learning.
- Make capital improvements to accommodate Grade 7-8 at Baker High School (with separation between Grades 7-8 and 9-12). Would address middle school enrollment levels, utilize existing high school space and provide 7th and 8th grade access to vocational programs.
- Fund site improvements, demolition, furnishing and equipment and bond issuance costs.

A citizen oversight committee would be established to ensure proceeds are used for

purposes indicated. Bonds would mature in not to exceed 31 years from issuance. The estimated tax rate is \$1.97 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Actual levy rate may differ due to changes in interest rates and assessed value.

Any registered voter who is dissatisfied with this ballot title may petition the Circuit Court to review the ballot title issued by the District Attorney. The deadline for filing a petition and notifying the county clerk is no later than 5:00 PM on August 6, 2018. The appeal procedures are outlined in ORS 255.155.

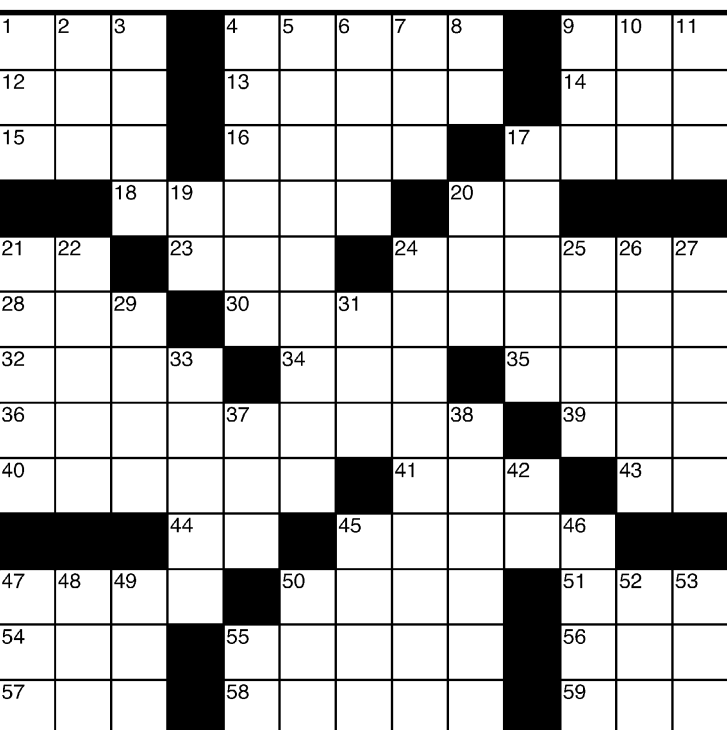

Explanation of Changes: After adoption of the 2018/19 budget in April, the District elected to proceed with upgrades to HVAC systems at LHS, Greenwood and Island City for a cost of \$4.8 million. The project was funded by \$1.5 million from cash reserves and \$3.3 million was secured through a commercial loan from Banner Bank. Appropriations in the General Fund are now required to make the first debt service payment in December, which is being paid by incentives from utility companies (\$100,000) and budget reductions for electrical and natural gas proposed savings due to energy upgrades. (\$75,000).

Explanation of Changes: Due to unforeseen circumstances when creating the 18/19 budget, transfer authority is required between special revenue funds 220 & 251 and 231 & 203 to improve accountability and maximize the use of available resources. Appropriations are also now required for carryover from 2017/18 in Fund 201 for the planned purchase of athletic equipment and band uniforms in 2018/19. In addition, two federal grants held in funds 224 & 228 were not completely spent during the 17/18 fiscal year, thus additional appropriations are now required to allow an extended period of time to finish the grants in 2018/19.
