Free training to focus on child protection

Baker City Christian Church is hosting a free community training titled "Understanding Sex Offenders and How to Protect Children" on Aug. 29 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Formerly with the Oregon Department of Human Services Child Welfare, Sarah Hatfield will lead the training and, "my hope is to provide education and prevention tools regarding child sexual abuse; she stated in an email to the Herald.

According to a flier, the training will help those attending, "gain an understanding of sex offenders and be equipped with tools to prevent child sex abuse."

Forest Service bans all fires, chain saw use

With hot, dry weather continuing, the U.S. Forest Service has banned all campfires and chain saw use on the Wallowa-Whitman, Umatilla and Malheur national forests.

Phase C of public use restrictions is in effect. While those are in place, visitors can use stoves and heaters that burn liquid or gas fuel. Smoking is allowed only in enclosed vehicles and buildings, developed recreation sites, or in cleared areas.

At this year's Baker County Fair livestock auction, the 81st annual event, 171 market animals brought in a preliminary grand total of \$288,605.55.

While this is the most ani-

mals sold at auction in recent years, this year's preliminary total is just shy of 2015's record of \$299,757.01. However, the OSU Extension office calls this year's number a "preliminary" total for a reason, as donations are still rolling in.

5J board hears about new plan

■ BHS student group explains the new Renaissance program to the Baker School Board

Eight young women brought energy and enthusiasm for a new program that will be implemented at Baker High School this year to the Baker School Board Thursday night.

Students who spoke Thursday about the Renaissance program were seniors Abby Baker, Hannah Johnson, Emily Black and Alayna Callaway; juniors Laura Illingsworth and Jazmine Labonte; and sophomores Renee Blincoe and Makayla Mills.

Five BHS staff members, Principal Greg Mitchell, Assistant Principal Chelsea Hurliman, and teachers, Dawna Blincoe, Adriene Oster and Toni Zikmund accompanied the students to Orlando, Florida, in July for the 2018 Jostens Renaissance National Conference to learn more about the program. The conference theme was "The School Culture

Mitchell explained that the students applied to attend the training last spring. They will be charged with promoting the program's core values to other students, he said.

A Renaissance class taught by Zikmund will be offered to students during sixth period when the new school year gets under

In their presentation to the Board, the students explained that the Renaissance program is different than the leadership program that has been in place for many years at BHS.

The leadership group, which includes Associated Student Body officers and class officers, has oversight of activities and makes decisions for the school. That group will continue to make decisions on matters such as how student body funds are spent on clubs and activities.

The Renaissance program, on the other hand, will be led by a team of educators, support staff, and student leaders who work to improve school climate and culture.

With a theme of "No More Ghosts!" the program aims to include all students in activities with the goal of working to ensure that all students feel included, the students told the board.

Poor air quality hampers early sports practices

Monday, the first day of fall sports practices, was sunny and a pleasant 88 degrees, a reprieve from the triple-digit temperatures suffocating the area last week.

By Tuesday, however, the air was taking on a hazy tinge and the

weather warnings were rolling in. For members of the Baker High School football staff, this meant refreshing the air quality index hourly, said coach Dave Johnson.

They also kept an eye on the Oregon School Activities Association(OSAA) air quality guidelines to interpret conditions and to decide whether or not practice should continue as usual.

On Tuesday and Wednesday,

conditions entered the "unhealthy for sensitive groups" rating and Johnson said they moved practice indoors and started later.

Baker remained in the yellow, or "moderate," zone Thursday, and Johnson said they were able to take practice back out to the field.

"We're trying to get back on track," Johnson said Thursday. "We're back outside this morning."

Although they can still have practice if they move indoors, Johnson said they're limited with what they can do in the gym.

Titus Wilson, head coach of Burnt River High School's football team at Unity, said he, too, finds taking it indoors too limiting.
