### 10 YEARS AGO from the Baker City Herald August 27, 2008

By a 4-2 vote, the Baker City Council gave final approval Tuesday night to a sidewalk utility fee designed to, over the next five years, pay to repair or build sections of as many as 300 sidewalks.

The fee — \$1 per month for residents, \$2 for businesses — is expected to raise up to \$60,000 annually, with no less than 25 percent going toward grants of up to \$1,000 to help residents repair or construct sidewalks.

### ONE YEAR AGO from the Baker City Herald August 28, 2017

Summer vacation has ended for Baker students but summer most certainly has not.

In fact the new school year that started this morning arrived one day after the hottest day of what's been one of the hottest, driest summers in the past 75 years in Baker City.

The temperature Sunday topped out at 101 degrees at the Baker City Airport.

The couple, who live in Bowen Valley south of Baker City, have also shown their Duster at shows in Boise, Union and La Grande.

Keith said they've restored other cars, but none involved as much work as the Duster.

Next to the car the Jensens displayed a photo album with pictures of their car in various stages of the rebuild, including photos of the \$50,000 worth of parts they installed.

Once Keith retires from his businesses, Bowen Valley Archery and Jensen's Ag Service, and Janet retires from working in supplies at St. Alphonsus Medical Center, the couple hope to restore more cars. They also hope to travel to even more car shows.

While they said they have 26 awards from about 30 car shows, they aren't necessarily looking for a trophy when they enter the Duster in an event.

"We just go out to enjoy the people and the cars," Keith said. "It's just a bonus if you win something."

The couple have three sons and their oldest, Allen, 38, helped his father restore the Duster.

Keith said that one day, the Duster will be Allen's.
