Two Brothers Move Company From Idaho To Baker City

Taking A Fresh Dip

Two brothers who started a business in Idaho and have the U.S. military as a major client have moved their company to Baker

Scott and Todd Springer created Hydro-Dip in 2007.

The term "hydro-dipping," which the Springers popularized in the industry, is the process of applying camouflage and other types of graphics to three-dimensional plastic or metal objects, ranging from motorcycle helmets to gun stocks to ATV parts, by dipping them in water.

The company deals with personal retail orders as well as larger contracts with other companies and government organizations.

When the Springers started their company,

they planned to work out of a garage in Meridian.

But the tank they bought for hydrodipping was too big, so they found a larger space to set up their

business.

The Springers moved their company to Baker City earlier this year because they didn't want their kids to grow up in a larger city — Meridian's population is about 95,000.

Second charged in theft of gun

A second Baker City man has been charged with a felony in connection with the theft of a handgun from the scene of a teenage boy's suicide Sept. 5 in Baker City.

Daniel Jason Blood, 34, was indicted by a Baker County grand jury on two counts of first-degree theft, a Class C felony, and one count of being a felon in possession of a firearm, also a Class C felony. Blood is ac-

The sale was not made, Shirtcliff said, and authorities have recovered the gun, which belonged to the family of Izah Nicholas Gonzalez, 14. Gonzalez's body was found Sept. 5 at the skate park near Sam-O Swim Center.

Man killed by dogs had permit

Neighbors of the Baker City man who was killed earlier this month by a bite from one of his six dogs said the animals, which they described as pit bulls, were wellbehaved in their presence.

Baker City Police did receive a complaint on July 26 regarding one of Mitchelle Segerdahl's dogs.

One of the dogs reportedly had nipped at someone's ankle and was growling and acting aggressively, Police Chief Dustin Newman said. Police met with Segerdahl, 53, of 2251 Mitchell Ave. in south Baker City, and the issue was resolved. No citation was issued.

Newman described Segerdahl's dogs as "mixed breeds" and not necessarily pit bulls.
