School board to review Summer Academy

The Baker School Board will hear a review of its Summer Academy program when it meets Thursday night.

The Board's September meeting, reset to Sept. 27 from its usual third Thursday of the month, will begin at 6 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall, 1655 First St.

The Summer Academy report will be presented by Angela Lattin, Brooklyn Primary dean of students and coordinator of Summer Academy.

In other business, Superintendent Mark Witty will recognize Umpqua Bank as the District's business of the quarter.

The Board also is scheduled to:

- Hear reports from District administrators.
- Review personnel reports, including — thehiring of Natalie Morgan on a one-vear-only temporary contract to teach biology at Baker High School; transfers of classified employees, Janet Conant from paraprofessional to secretary at Brooklyn Primary and Becky Cross from custodian to cook at Brooklyn Primary; classified hirings of Kevin Lee as a paraprofessional at Brooklyn Primary, Amy Roseborough as a paraprofessional at

J.S. Griffin as a custodian and Sophia Galyen as a paraprofessional at Brooklyn.

In regard to extra-duty contracts, Kate Sizer has resigned as Baker Middle School tennis coach, Those hired on new contracts are Allison Duman, BHS head cheer coach; Kaylee Tilford, BHS assistant volleyball coach; Harold Watson and Roland Hobson, BMS football coaches; and Emily Raneau, BMS cross-country coach.

- Receive 2018-19 Parent-Student Handbooks.
- Read for the first time revised policies ranging from staff ethics to special education and public solicitation in district facilities.

Under discussion topics, Witty is expected to report on a committee appointed should a proposed \$48 million bond measure pass in the Nov. 6 election. The 11-member citizen-led committee would be charged "with monitoring the planned improvements, progress, schedule and costs of the bond program," according to information on the District website at bsdbond.org

Witty also will provide an update about the bond issue and discuss plans to install a new greenhouse at the high school to replace the former structures damaged by the heavy snow loads during the winter of 2016-17.

Bond oversight committee members named

Eleven community residents have been appointed to a committee that will oversee the proposed Baker School District capital construction bond if voters approve the \$48 million measure in the Nov. 6 election.

Superintendent Mark Witty appointed people with expertise in construction, fiance and related fields, a District press release stated.

"I am pleased with the collective expertise represented by the individuals who have come forward to serve on the Bond Oversight Committee,"

Witty stated in the press release.

"Their knowledge base will be critical in providing effective management of the bond proceeds if the community chooses to approve the bond measure," he said.

The committee would work directly with the superintendent and have access to reports, construction sites and documents pertinent to their charge. However, they would have no independent authority to obligate district funds, the press release stated.

Their responsibilities would

• Review and participate in the process to select general contractors, architects, ven-

dors and consultants for major projects

- Review financial statements, project scope, construction documents and bid solicitations to ensure bond funds are spent only on voterapproved projects
- Regularly inspect school facilities and grounds to ensure bond revenues are expended appropriately
- Recommend policies and procedures to enhance accountability of bond funds
- Communicate about bond progress (annual report to the community and district website)
- Inform program decisions made by the superintendent and Board.


