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Larsen is in the Baker County Jail. Her bail was set at \$252,500.

The proposal councilors will consider Tuesday would divert industrial park sales revenue into a fund the City Council could use for

"incentive job creation" and pay for "capital projects that enhance community development."

The Council earlier this month agreed to sell 1.38 acres at the industrial park for \$22,537 to a Baker City

business that sells sewing patterns and apparel fabric.

The city owns 65 acres at the park, which is at the northwest corner of the city.

The city could put industrial park sales revenue into the city's general fund,

which also includes the police and fire departments, but that could "skew the budget as this money could not be counted on to fund ongoing programs," City Manager Fred Warner Jr. wrote in a report to councilors.

Richland, 1953-2018

Gary Perkins, 64, of Richland, died Oct. 17, 2018, at his sister's home in Baker City surrounded by his family.

At his request, there will be no funeral.

Gary was born on Dec. 4, 1953, at Baker, the son of Eugene Brent Perkins Jr. and Annie Felando Perkins.

He graduated from Baker High School in 1972 with honors. While in school he excelled in track and field.

The day after he graduated he left for San Pedro, California and moved in with his grandparents, Anka and Frank Felando. His first job was working for Starkist Tuna.

The next year he began attending DeVry Institute at Phoenix, Arizona, and he later received his associate degree in electrical engineering. After graduation, he took a job with Xerox Corporation.

His talent and innovation landed him in Florida where he was instrumental in installing camera systems on Voyager I and II that went to Jupiter and Saturn.

Gary eventually moved to San Diego and started working for Linkabit. While at work he met his first wife, Barbara. They had two children, Natalie and Brian.

Gary decided to start his own business, which he called Microware Technology. As an electrical engineer, his company's purpose was to design computer parts and help with computer technology. During the next two decades Gary had a very successful career. He and Barbara shared 25 outstanding years raising their children and enjoying their love of outdoor activities.

In 2007, Gary moved to Arizona where he met his second wife Dale Lynn. In 2009 he moved back to Eastern Oregon to help take care of his parents and the Perkins family ranch (Century Farm) on Chandler Lane. Gary and Dale Lynn spent several years traveling back and forth between Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, and Oregon.

Gary was larger than life and loved to travel and seek adventure, family members said. His love for fishing was always prevalent.

Over several decades he owned various fishing vessels. Gary's favorite place

to fish was in Mexico. He also enjoyed scuba diving and was always in pursuit of fish, lobster, abalone and scallops.

One of the hobbies that he thoroughly enjoyed was snow skiing. His favorite place to ski was at Lake Tahoe and for years he frequented his condo next to Heavenly Ski Resort.

Gary's other favorite hobby was golfing, which he excelled at. He loved playing rounds of golf on the golf course that was right off his house at Laughlin, Nevada.

He was preceded in death by his mother and father; and his beloved niece, Jessica.

Survivors include his daughter, Natalie Bennett; his son, Brian Perkins; his sister, Shirley Dinger; his brothers, Frank and Steve Perkins; and numerous nieces and nephews.
