Boston, Dodgers make history

LOS ANGELES — Brian Dozier swung bananas from a rope over the dugout railing.

How appropriate. The longest game in World Series history was bananas.

Twenty-three players on each team, including nine pitchers.

Eighteen innings — four more than any of the previous 662 World Series games.

Seven hours, 20 minutes — 1:39 longer than any

Series game played before. Walker Buehler threw the first pitch in autumn

twilight at 5:10 p.m. Max Muncy homered on the 561st and last at 12:30

Even Wimbledon is instituting fifth-set tiebreakers next year when tied 12-12 after John Isner's 70-68 first-round triumph over Nicolas Mahut in 2010 and Isner's 26-24 semifinal defeat to Kevin Anderson this year.

No U.S. major team sport DOUBLED the length of a game in its championship. Notably, a Boston team has been involved in the longest title match in all four of the major sports.

Only once has the Super Bowl gone to overtime, with only an extra 11:02 needed for New England's win over Atlanta in 2017.

Beavers' epic comeback stuns Colorado

BOULDER, Colo. — When Travon McMillian ran 75 yards for a touchdown against Oregon State on the first play of the second half, the Colorado Buffaloes

admittedly let up, as did their fans. Why not?

It was 31-3.

The Buffs are about to go bowling. The Beavers are getting bowled over

Fans figured they might want to enjoy a beautiful autumn afternoon, streaming to the gates for an early exit from this blowout rather than watching any more of the Beavers' 23rd consecutive road loss.

"I guess you'd call this a gutwrencher," Colorado coach Mike MacIntyre said after his Buffaloes matched their biggest blown lead in program history in a 41-34 overtime loss Saturday.

"We were rolling," MacIntyre said, "and the wheels just rolled right off."

Jack Colletto's 1-yard sneak in the extra period gave Oregon State its first lead and the Beavers' defense held on four downs inside the 7 to give first-year head coach Jonathan Smith his first

league victory.

It was Jake Luton who rallied the Beavers (2-6, 1-5 Pac-12) from a 28-point second-half deficit but they wouldn't have their first road win since 2014 without Colletto, who returned from an awful first half in his first career start to score twice on keepers to keep the comeback alive.

"The guys never got down," Luton insisted.

Even when they trailed by four touch-

The Buffaloes (5-3, 2-3) were seemingly safe when McMillian, who was held to 25 yards on 10 first-half carries, took the first snap of the second half, burst up the middle and raced untouched for a 75-yard score and a 28-point lead.

One play. Seventy-five yards. Twelve

"We weren't supposed to lose this game," McMillian said.

Then ...

"I think we might have (coasted) a little bit," Buffs QB Steven Montez said.

Behind Luton's return — he's been dealing with a high ankle sprain — the Beavers answered McMillian's TD with their own 75-yard scoring drive.

Only, this one took 17 plays and $6\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. It included a trio of thirddown conversions and two fourth-down conversions, capped by an 8-yard TD to Isaiah Hodgins on fourth-and-2.

"That gave them some momentum," MacIntyre said. "And we didn't sniff the end zone again."

REGULATION REGRETS

Both teams blew a chance to win it in the final seconds of regulation.

After Oregon State tied it at 34 with 29 seconds left on Luton's 10-yard touchdown pass to Trevon Bradford, defensive end Terrance Lang blocked Jordan Choukair's extra point.

The Buffs quickly reached the Beavers' 36, but Davis Price badly missed a 53-yard field goal attempt as time expired.

OVERTIME MISCUES

Facing a deficit for the first time all afternoon, Steven Montez hit Jay MacIntyre for 21 yards at the 7. But a keeper netted no yards and a pass into the end zone was broken up. On third down, K.D. Nixon, who caught 13 passes for 198 yards and two touchdowns, couldn't hold onto a third TD pass.

Wildcats roll past No. 19 Oregon, 44-15

TUCSON, Ariz. — J.J. Taylor burst through holes and leaped over defenders. Khalil Tate was sharp in his return. The defense created turnovers, so did special teams.

Stuck in a recent rut, Arizona picked a great time to play its best game of the season.

Taylor ran for 212 yards and two touchdowns, Tate threw for three scores and the Wildcats dominated No. 19 Oregon 44-15 on Saturday night.

"We talked about playing four quarters," Arizona coach playing a perfect game, but playing four quarters and we did that."

Arizona (4-5, 3-3 Pac-12) jumped on the Ducks early and never let them up, turning one Oregon miscue after another into scores.

Tate threw for 189 yards on 19-of-33 passing with an interception after missing last week's game against UCLA with a left ankle injury. Shawn Poindexter caught two touchdown passes and Josh Pollack kicked three field goals for Arizona, which had lost three of four.

"That was my first time missing a game in my whole

something different for me to adjust to," Tate said. "I knew I had to bounce back and lead my team to a W."

Oregon (5-3, 2-3) got off to a slow start for the second straight week, committed three turnovers and two costly mistakes on special teams. The Ducks were forced to pass after falling behind early and had 270 total yards — 190 below their average - against one of the Pac-12's worst defenses.

"This was a gut check," coach Mario Cristobal said. "We've got to make sure we're working the right way, doing the right things and

getting ready to take the brunt of what comes with a loss like this."

Oregon fell behind 27-0 by halftime last week, preventing any chance of a comeback in a 34-20 loss to No. 14 Washington State.

The Ducks got stuck in the starting gate again in the

Arizona picked apart Oregon's defense on its opening drive and the Ducks somehow left Poindexter uncovered on a 22-yard TD reception.

Oregon's offense sputtered early and the Ducks kept turning it over to give the
