The noble fir grew about eight miles up a gravel road that wasn't built to accommodate 80-foot trailers.

Workers had to widen the road in places to ensure the

truck-trailer combination. which stretches 102 feet in all, could reach the tree.

The noble fir was cut on Nov. 2.

Swanson, who will accompany the tree on its entire trek to the Capitol, said she had always wanted to retrace the route of the Oregon Trail. But she had never traveled farther east than Pocatello, Idaho.

That city happens to be the tree's next stop. The noble fir will visit Pocatello and Soda Springs, Idaho, today, then cross into Wyoming on Saturday.

The tree visited more towns in Oregon than in any other state, with stops in

Sweet Home, Albany, Springfield, McKenzie Bridge, Oakridge, Bend, Detroit, Salem, Oregon City and The Dalles before Wednesday night's arrival in Baker City. That was the final Oregon location on the fir's itinerary.

"We were looking for small towns along the way, and iconic Oregon Trail sites, and Baker City was perfect," Swanson said.

Swanson said that although the Forest Service sets up an information booth at each stop and provides ladders and felt pens so residents can sign the banner affixed to the trailer, "each city makes the event its own."

She was overwhelmed by the response in Baker City, where hundreds of people turned out on Main Street

to see the tree, sign the banner, drink hot cocoa, listen to carolers and see Father Christmas and Smokey Bear.

"Last night was incredible," Swanson said. "You guys had a beautiful celebration. I'm impressed by how much joy there is in the air."

Following the ceremony the tree followed a police escort to its overnight stay at OTEC's compound.

Swanson said Forest Service law enforcement officers who travel with the tree consult with local police to find a secure place to store the tree at night.

"The tree needs to be protected — it is a national treasure," she said.

Actually the noble fir was pampered even while it was still standing.

Swanson said Forest Service employees watered the tree before it was felled to ensure it would be wellhydrated.

The enclosed trailer protects the tree from the elements, and it rests on special cradles that prevent damage to the limbs.

A vinyl water bladder is attached to the tree's trunk so it can have a drink if needed.

Swanson said the fir hasn't sucked up as much water as Forest Service officials expected.

The tree travels with a considerable entourage. including seven Forest Service employees and four law enforcement officers from the agency.

Central Oregon Truck Company of Redmond supplied the truck and a team of drivers to haul the tree on its 3,000-mile route.

Although Swanson had more than two years to build anticipation for the trip across the nation with a precious cargo, she said that so far it has not merely met, but exceeded, her expectations.

"Every single thing, from the cutting to the stops, has gone perfectly," she said Thursday. "Part of it is having such a great team."

Tax refunds likely in 2020

SALEM — A flood of state income tax revenue has the state economist forecasting that Oregon's "kicker" law will kick in next year, sending a projected median amount of \$174 back to each taxpayer.

"The kicker won't be paid out until after the biennium is over, with taxpayers getting the credit when they file in 2020 for the 2019 tax year," state economist Mark McMullen said Thursday.

Under state law, any personal income tax revenue that is above 2 percent of the original two-year fiscal projection is sent back to taxpavers as a tax rebate. Because the money is "kicked back" to taxpayers, it is commonly referred to as a kicker, even by state officials.

The December Economic & Revenue Outlook report, released Wednesday, shows that revenue is on track to exceed projections by about 7 percent above the original projected level. That translates to a potential kicker of just over \$724 million. The final kicker amount will be determined in August, after the end of the fiscal biennium in June.
