Leading 28-18 at halftime, the Bulldogs went scoreless the first five minutes of the second half and fell behind 31-28.

Baker then went on a 9-0 run, seven by Sand, to build its lead back to 37-31. The Bulldogs led 37-34 at the break.

Four points each from Caden Long and Gabe Gambleton to start the fourth quarter gave Baker a 45-36 advantage.

Redmond managed to get back to within four points with 4:15 left in the game.

But another Sand basket on a rebound and eight straight Baker free throws built the margin back to

55-45 with 29.7 seconds remaining.

Baker jumped out to a 9-0 lead in the first quarter on five points from Long and four from Gambleton.

The Bulldogs led 11-5 after one period.

Baker then built its lead to as many as a dozen points twice late in the second quarter before leading 28-18 at halftime.
