












Mountain Snowpack Above Average In Many Places

Deepening Dritts



Despite January weather being warmer and drier than average, the snowpack in the mountains of Northeastern Oregon is above average in some places - and better than it was a year ago across the region. This scene is on the east slopes of the Elkhorn Mountains near Anthony Lakes.

This morning's meager accumulation notwithstanding, this hasn't been a noteworthy winter in Baker City.

Not much snow. And no below-zero temperatures.

It is much more like its immediate predecessor than like the winter of 2016-17, when snowdrifts in town topped 2 feet and temperatures plummeted to 25 below

But the situation this winter is quite different in the mountains.

At most measuring sites around the Elkhorn, Wallowa and Blue mountains the water content in the snowpack is near or above average.

And at every station the snowpack is deeper than it was a year ago.

The mountain snowpack is a key reservoir for municipal water supplies as well as irrigation and recreation.
