Deteriorating Trend Continues With Baker City Streets

Paying for Potholes

Baker City's streets continued to get rougher over the past year, a trend that dates back almost two decades.

And although a 2017 transportation package approved by the Oregon Legislature has boosted the city's annual gas tax revenue by about \$60,000, the budget for street maintenance falls short of what's needed to reverse the trend.

The City Council reviewed the 2019 pavement management plan during a work session Wednesday evening at City Hall.

In 2000, the city, which reviews the condition of its paved streets each year, rated 97 percent of the street mileage as being "good" or "very good." Just 2.76 miles were rated as

Now just 52 percent of streets are rated as "good" or "very good," and 24.78 miles are "fair."

Jay Fuzi, an engineering technician with the city, rates streets each fall in five areas. When possible he drives the same route, in the same vehicle, each year. Fuzi has been responsible for the street ratings for the past eight years.

He rates streets based on ride quality, surface cracking, trench settlement, drainage issues and other factors affecting the street's structural integrity.

Sewer

Baker City residents could pay up to 40 percent more for sewer service by 2021 as the city prepares to build a wastewater pipeline and storage lagoon that will cost an estimated \$11 million.

That is the worst-case scenario, however, Public Works Director Michelle Owen told city councilors during a work session Wednesday.

The current sewer rate for residential customers is \$23.26 per month.

The highest rate city officials have looked at is \$32.50, an increase of \$9.24 per month.

"We know we are going to be in the \$30 range, there is virtually no question," City Manager Fred Warner Jr. said.

Boosting the monthly rate to \$30 would represent an increase of 29 percent.


The city would raise rates over two years, staring July 1, 2019, with the monthly charge not rising above \$27.88 then.


The city probably will take out a loan to build the treatment plant. Optional sources include the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, Business Oregon and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"The goal is to keep the project cost as low as possible," Owen said, "so we borrow less, we pay back less, so the rate can be less."
