Thatcher's Ace Hardware store, which includes an independent sporting goods department separate from the Ace Hardware chain, Irader Ray's, which sells new and used guns, and York's Sporting Goods, will not raise the age limit for buyers of long rifles and ammunition from 18 to 21 or take AR-15 rifles off their shelves.

Several large national and regional retailers, including Bi-Mart, have done so since the Feb. 14 school shooting in Parkland, Florida.

Bi-Mart has never stocked the AR platform rifles, according to a press release from the corporation announcing its decision to raise the minimum age for selling long guns from 18 to 21.

On many early mornings, Joyce and sons were picking berries at Thomas' Farm a couple of miles east of Mount Vernon or fruit at Thomas' Orchards in Kimberly. For some time, Joyce provided day care and ironing for a nearby family. She started working out

of the home as a motel maid, moving on to a short term in banking as a bookkeeper before working at numerous retail businesses on Main Street in John Day: Quisenberry's, Knox's, Mabel Millen's Dress Shop, and Len's Drugs. She so enjoyed providing customer service, meeting and knowing customers and coworkers. She maintained some social ties and friendships through her active membership and leadership in the Degree of Honor. As life moved on, John S.

Pryse, a carpenter by craft from Prairie City entered and became a part of her life. She and John married in 1963. Joyce and John had many
